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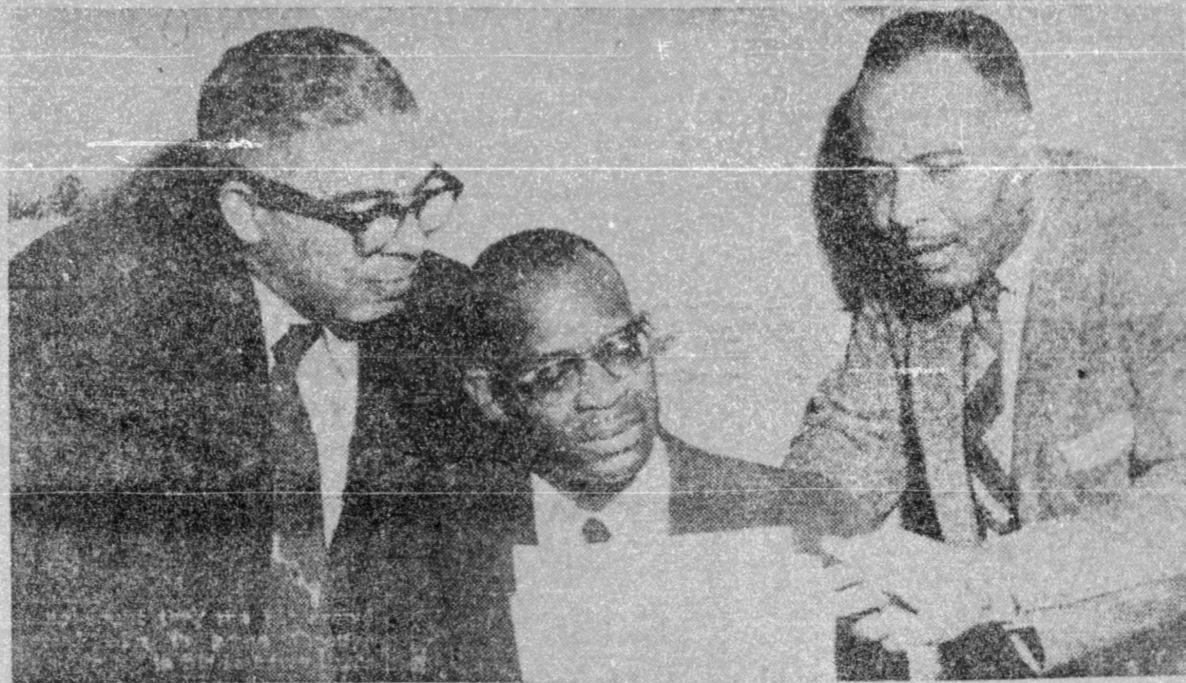
Virginians To Stage "Pilgrimage Of Prayer" In Richmond New Year's Day

Dr. Nkrumah Favors Every Form Of Non-Violent Action To Aid Africa

ACCRA, Ghana (ANP) — Dr. Kwame Nkrumah, who is officiating here as chairman of the Ghana People's Party, delivered a stirring address Friday to the 200 delegates from 25 countries, attending the All-African Peoples Conference.

"This assembly," he said, "marks the beginning of a new epoch. My people overflows at the sight of so large a number of African comrades in arms who, imbued with the fervent desire to see Africa, free, unfettered, and united, have gathered here together on African soil for the first time in the history of our continent."

The speaker voiced the hope that the recent political and economic union of Ghana and Guinea would constitute the nucleus for a united West Africa composed of other independent states.

"It is only within this context," he pointed out, "of interdependence and cooperation, regardless of the constitutional framework in which it will ultimately find expression, that we shall be able to solve the disastrous legacies of imperialism."

Such days, he reminded his applauding listeners, were coming to an end.

"It is our belief," he concluded, "that within Africa, the peace of the world will be better guaranteed, for the elimination of imperialism and colonialism will remove the jealousies and antagonisms which have led to two world wars and are keeping us now in a constant fear of tension with the threat of nuclear weapons."

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Holiday Season Is Different Now For Many Of Ex-Sharecroppers

WASHINGTON, D. C. (ANP) — This year's Yuletide season is very different for thousands of former tenants, sharecroppers, and day laborers who have bought farms of their own over the years with the help of the Farmers Home Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

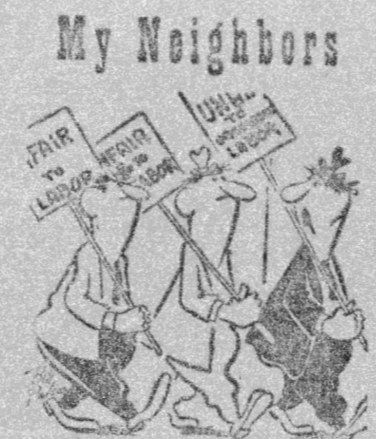
Things are much better for them this year-round, say officials of the agency. But it is during the holiday season that many of the families are reminded how far they have come.

BUY 40 ACRES AND A HOUSE

These sharecroppers made 15 years ago when they applied to Farmers Home for a loan to buy a small farm. The loan was approved and they purchased 40 acres with a fairly good house on it.

"When the Government made us a loan to buy our farm," Brandon recalls, "it was the only place in the world that would extend us that kind of credit, because we didn't own a thing but a cow and little furniture."

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Youth Who Started Klan Is Suspended

JERSEY CITY, N. Y. (ANP) — Two freshmen of Jersey City Junior college were suspended for allegedly attempting to form a northern chapter of the Ku Klux Klan at the school last week.

Two special detectives of the Jersey City Police department were sent to investigate an anonymous report of students within the college forming a group called the "Klavan" to discriminate against Jews, Catholics and Negroes.
