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### Guinea Slaps Back At France

CONARY, Guinea — (AP) — President Sekou Toure of Guinea was sharp in his reply to recent French overtures. Although France has refused to extend formal recognition of the new government of its former colony, still French officials continue to work out deals. President Toure announced to the Guinea Assembly he had received a telegram from the French Government saying that Robert Barques, Inspector General for French Overseas Territories, was due to arrive in Conary soon with a personal message from the French President, General De Gaulle, to President Toure. He said he had replied immediately that negotiations or conversations depends on France's "clear recognition of the Republic of Guinea." The Assembly adopted a resolution denying the "new shift" that is being of the French Government which while refusing to recognize the Guinea Government still wants to engage it in interminable negotiations.

### Wisconsin Paper Mill May Build Plant Near Tuskegee To Offset Big Boycott

TUSKEGEE INSTITUTE, Ala. — In recent weeks many Negroes of the Tuskegee community have expressed concern regarding the employment policies of the Sterling Pulp and Paper Co. of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, which is reportedly considering locating one of its mills in the Tuskegee area. A month ago officials of the company were contacted relative to its hiring policies but to date no reply has been received.

The location of this mill in the Tuskegee area is reportedly designed to give economic relief to the local white business community which has lost considerable Negro trade since the enactment of a 1957 legislative act which gerrymandered all but 10 Negro voters out of the city limits of Tuskegee.

As a result of this act the majority of the Negro citizens, representing 85 per cent of the total population of Mason County, withdrew their patronage from the businesses of the white community.

Presently the major payrolls of the Tuskegee area are the Veterans Administration Hospital and Tuskegee Institute, both overwhelmingly Negro. Prior to this time there were no apparent efforts to encourage industry to locate in the Tuskegee area.

According to a report in the Tuskegee News (white) "location of the multi-million dollar paper mill here would result in doubling the white population of Tuskegee in two years. Of further concern to the Negro community is the fact that news releases state that the outspoken segregationist, Governor-Fleet John Patterson, accompanied local officials to Wisconsin to aid them in the negotiations to secure location of the mill here."

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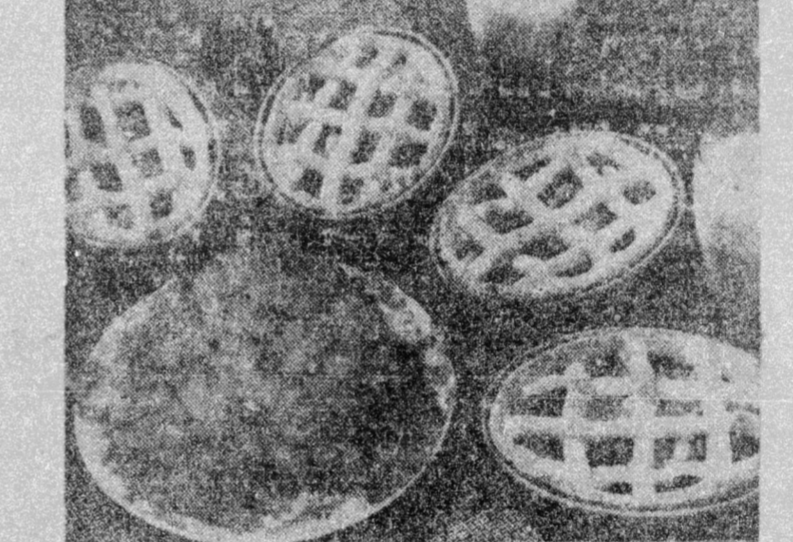

### Beef and Vegetable Pies

2 teaspoons salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 pound beef stew meat cut in 1-inch cubes  
1/4 cup shortening  
2 cups water  
1 small bay leaf

Mix 1/2 cup flour, salt and pepper. Lay meat with flour mixture. Add water and fat. Cover and cook over low heat about 1 1/2 hours. Add potatoes, carrots and onions; continue cooking until peas and vegetables are tender. Stir in peas. Mix 2 tablespoons flour with water. Stir into stew and cook until gravy begins to thicken, stirring constantly. Fill individual casserole dishes 3/4 full. Top with Biscuit Strips and bake in hot oven (425°F.) 15 to 20 minutes.

**BISCUIT STRIPS**  
2 cups sifted enriched self-rising flour  
1/2 to 3/4 cup milk

Cut or rub shortening into flour mixture is crumbly. Add milk to make a soft dough. Turn out on a lightly oiled board or pastry cloth and knead gently 20 seconds. Roll out to an 8 1/2-inch rectangle. Cut into strips 1/2 inch wide. Place strip around edge of casserole dish. Make lattice top with remaining strips. Makes 4 servings.
