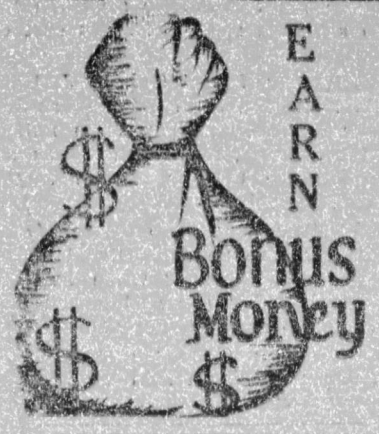

Knife, Gun Flash Western Style:

MURDER AT MIDNIGHT

Father Of Seven Slain; Two In Hospital After Gun-Knife Battle At "Birdland"

Albert Hudson, 33, of 805 S. Person Street, was allegedly stabbed to death at his place of business, The Birdland Club, S. Bloodworth Street, Walter Terrell, 27, of E. Cabarrus Street, is believed to have wielded the fatal knife wound. Hudson was the father of seven children, none of whom are over 15 years of age.

The shooting is said to have occurred at midnight last Saturday and followed an argument between Hudson and Terrell. Hudson died minutes after arriving at St. Agnes Hospital from a knife wound in the heart and two in the back.

5,000 View Remains Of Undertaker

It has been said that "Good men often die young." In the opinion of many Raleighites interviewed, the death of Lawrence Thompson Lightner at the age of 40, was substantial proof to back up that saying.

Lightner, who was manager of the funeral home bearing his name at 312 Smithfield Street, and an active council candidate, passed this "vale of tears" Wednesday afternoon at 4:30 after his most recent illness of three days.

Near his bedside at Duke Hospital, Durham, were his wife, Mrs. Roberta Fair Lightner, his brother, Clarence (Baby) Lightner, Mrs. Marguerite Lightner, a sister-in-law, and the Rev. A. J. Turner, longtime friend.

After reportedly losing consciousness early Thursday morning, Lightner was admitted to St. Agnes Hospital in the afternoon, but succumbed under an oxygen tent at Duke Wednesday after it was decided at St. Agnes that all chances had gone everything possible for him there.

Funeral services were conducted Friday at 4 p.m. from the Davis Street Presbyterian Church with the Rev. Robert L. Shirley, pastor, presiding. The Rev. A. J. Turner read the scripture and prayer was offered by Dr. W. R. Strassner.

Government Slates School For Norfolk Sailors' Kids

WASHINGTON — The Government announced Monday it will set up an integrated school next month for 500 Navy children who live on the Norfolk, Va., Naval

Base unless Norfolk's closed public schools are reopened before then.

Arthur S. Flemming, secretary of health, education and welfare, also told a news conference the administration is preparing legislation to permit the federal government to set up schools for children of military personnel who live off of military bases.

Present law permits the government to provide schooling only for children who live on federal property when other public education is not available.

The Navy announced last week it would seek funds from Flem-

Gov. Collins Of Florida Calls For Patience, Understanding

DAYTONA, Fla. — Florida Governor Leroy Collins, lashing out at those who would do away with schools to prevent integration, Monday, called for patience and understanding in solving race problems.

He said it was "tragic" that certain groups in the state would abolish public schools because of emotionalism, timidity, crass indifference, or political advantage.

"Ignorance is the greatest enemy known to human progress," Collins

told more than 20 persons at a meeting sponsored by the Daytona Beach Chamber of Commerce.

He said he is convinced there was a "middle-ground" where Florida citizens can progress toward good will in race relations and

UNCLE OF CAROLINIAN EMPLOYEE KILLED IN WRECK

NEW BERN — Joe Bunch Hilliard, 58, uncle of CAROLINIAN employee Thomas Hilliard, Jr., was killed and three persons injured Sunday night when a car driven by Mrs. Ida Adams, 35, a Garner school teacher, left the road ten miles north of New Bern on U. S. Highway 70 and overturned.

Hilliard died of head injuries shortly after arriving at the Good Shepherd Hospital here, according to Dr. J. E. Latham. Mrs. Adams sustained severe lacerations of the arm and back and chest injuries. Her husband, Samuel Adams, 33, suffered facial lacerations and an injured right shoulder. Yvonne Coleman, 4, of Gar-
