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
Professor At Bennett:
Dr. Edmonds Accepts New Position In New England
GREENSBORO—Beginning February 1, The Reverend Dr. Edwin R. Edmonds, presently engaged as Professor of Sociology at Bennett College, will assume duties as Minister of the Dixwell Avenue Congregational Church, New Haven, Connecticut.
While employed at Bennett College, Dr. Edmonds ably served as president of the Greensboro Branch of the NAACP and as Chairman of the NAACP State Conference of Branches Membership Committee. Under his leadership, the Greensboro Branch membership more than tripled in size. He was previously employed as Professor of Sociology and Chaplain at Delaware State College.
In addition, he has held positions as Program Director with the Greater Boston Soldiers and Sailors Organization, as Resident Supervisor with the National Youth Administration and as a teacher in the Adult Education Program in San Antonio, Texas.
A graduate of Morehouse Col-

lege, Atlanta, Georgia, Dr. Edmonds received his S.T.B. from the Boston University School of Theology and the Doctorate of Philosophy in Social Ethics from Boston University. An author of several articles in sociology, he has been the recipient of a Rosenwald and an Alfred H. Avery Fellowship.
Membership in professional organizations includes the American Association of University Professors, National Vocational Guidance Association, Association of Social Science Teachers as well as the Southwest Area YMCA Council.
Accompanied by his wife and four daughters, Dr. Edmonds will be assuming the pastorate of one of the leading churches of the New England area. Founded in 1820, Dixwell Avenue Congregational Church has a membership of 800 and a long history of community service. Historically, the church was one of the refuge stations on the "underground railroad," an undertaking long associated with the courageous work of Harriet Beecher Stowe.

Case histories of profitable integrated housing enterprises in Philadelphia, the San Francisco Bay area, Princeton, N. J., Chicago, Yellow Springs, Ohio, and Gary Indiana, Los Angeles and Las Vegas, were presented by their builders or sales agents.
Morris Millgram, president of Modern Community Developers, Inc. (MCD), and builder of nationally noted interracial developments in Philadelphia and Princeton, stated that special problems are faced by builders of integrated housing, but that much experience is available for their guidance. MCD, he said has been set-up to make that experience generally available.
Another speaker, Edward C. Eichler, vice-president of Eichler Homes, Inc., Palo Alto, Calif., said that his firm, largest home builders in the San Francisco Bay area, had been selling to all races since 1954. Without a quota, Eichler Homes have sold slightly under 1 percent of more than 6,000 homes to Negroes and a considerably greater percentage - but still a minority - to Orientals.
Other developments discussed have racial proportions up to 50 percent Negro. Re-sale values were uniformly reported as higher than original sales prices.

White Gangs Attack Youngsters In New Orleans Integrated Park
NEW ORLEANS (ANP) — A band of white teenagers last Monday attacked three groups of Negroes in the recently integrated City park.
Two of the Negroes were injured, one knocked unconscious. There were 18 in the group, including a Boy Scout troop. They said they were pelted by stones and clubs. The attack caught them by surprise.
Scoutmaster Herbert Jackson told police some \$200 in damage was done to his car by the rock-tossing white boys. Tires were damaged, the fenders bent and windows smashed.
The violence was the first in the city since several federal court orders went into effect last year. The City park was integrated a month ago by federal court order.
Police said they would continue their search for the offenders. They said they suspected many of the estimated 25 youths involved in the gangs were juveniles.

Employers Of Household Workers Must File With Internal Revenue
Employers of household workers must file a return for the October through December 1958 quarter on or before January 31, 1959, Taylor Langford, Group Supervisor of Internal Revenue for the Raleigh district reminded them today.
At the same time, John Ingle, district manager of the Raleigh social security office, pointed out that this obligation to file a return applies to every household employer who paid \$50 or more in cash wage to a cook, maid, laundress, or any other household employee during the calendar quarter. Returns must be filed after the close of each calendar quarter and are due April 30, July 31, October 31 and January 31 every year.
Most household employers will make their reports on Form 942. This is a special simplified form printed on the back of a return envelope. If you are a household employer who is already on the mailing list of the District Director of Internal Revenue, one of these forms was mailed to you before the end of December.
If social security taxes are due from a household employer who is not now on the mailing list, the employer should ask the District Director for the form and give him her name and address to be added to the mailing list before the next quarterly return is due.
The amount of the social security tax for the last calendar quarter of 1958 is 4-1-2 percent of the total cash wages paid to a household worker in a calendar quarter. The employee is expected to share this tax with the employer, however, it is the obligation of the employer to report and remit the total tax or 4-1-2 percent to the District Director of Internal Revenue.
Beginning with January 1959, the social security tax will be 2-1-2 percent each for employer and employee. While the \$50 cash wage test applies separately to each household worker in your employ, no report or social security tax is

Pastor Who Refused To Aid NAACP Keeps Post In Miss.

JACKSON, Miss. (ANP) — A minister reportedly under fire because he refused to make NAACP announcements from his pulpit will not lose his job. His congregation last week voted 'yes' to keep him as head of their church.
Members of the Greater Clark Street Baptist church voted 135-71 to keep Rev. Curtis L. West.
Because four deacons asked Chancery court to remove West from the pulpit, the church election was court supervised.
The Rev. West said the move to oust him centered around a controversy over the church's banking committee and because he would not make announcements of NAACP meetings during church services.
