### ANTI-BIAS AGENCY NOTES

BOSTON—(ANP)—In its annual report to Governor Foster Furcolo and the Massachusetts legislature, the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination (MCAD) noted that it had checked the brochures of 851 hotels, resorts, and motels during 1958 and found them free of any phrasing implying limitations based upon religion, color or race.

### ISSUE POSTERS

In view of this recurring problem the MCAD has decided to distribute, on a statewide basis, a special official poster which will quote the state statute on public accommodations and indicate that it is the declared policy of this establishment to serve all orderly persons on their request, without discrimination because of religion, color or race.

### NO VIOLATIONS

A study of occupancy and tenant selection methods of Housing Authorities at Boston, Brockton, Cambridge, Falmouth, Holyoke, New Bedford, Pittsfield, Plymouth, Springfield, and Worcester, covering 19,000 units occupied by whites and 2,113 by non-whites, failed to reveal any violations.

### ALSO, MCAD HAD 275 CONFERENCES

during the period under review with representatives of business, labor, education, civic organizations, minority groups, and community relations councils.

### PUBLICITY ASSISTED CATEGORY
