**KNOWLEDGE OF MOTIONS**  
QUESTION: In directing the activities of a club, what should the chairman or presiding officer know about motions?—Mrs. P. L. ANSWER: So far as the motions themselves are concerned, presiding officers should know which motions have precedence over others, the steps in making and disposing of motions, etc. There are six things, at least, that one should know about each motion:

1. Can the motion interrupt the speaker?
2. Does it require a second?
3. Is the motion debatable?
4. What vote is required to carry the motion?
5. May the motion be proposed again if lost?
6. What can be done with main motion? (Such as referring to a committee, postponing definitely, laying on the table, etc.)

Generally, we know that most motions are entitled to full and free debate. By so doing, it is hoped that the members will discuss the motion sufficiently to the point of arriving at a wise decision. All decisions are made official by a majority or two-thirds vote.

A few motions may have limited debate as in the case of the motion "Move to Take a Recess." The "Point of Order," "Request for Information," and "Rise to Parliamentary Inquiry" require no discussion.

## Dr. Harold Trigg Heard By Fayetteville Student Body

FAYETTEVILLE — Dr. Harold Trigg, prominent in the field of education, was guest speaker at the regular student assembly at Fayetteville State Teachers College.

Dr. Trigg spoke principally of the new work that he is now doing with the State Prison Department. He pointed out that the method of dealing with offenders today has changed considerably and that the new process is that of group education.

"We used the group as a vehicle of expression. No one can think long enough and think wrong," said Dr. Trigg.

In the course of his speech he called attention to the fact that the lowest method of adjustment in human affairs is force accompanied by fear. He concluded by saying that if we are to be successful as educators we must rid ourselves of the old method and educate the individual to his capacities and aptitudes so that he can be effective in our society.
