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# Bertie Named 'C'nty Of Year' In NC Rural Progress Drive

GREENSBORO — Bertie County was named this week winner of the North Carolina "County of the Year" award for outstanding rural progress during 1958. It had won out in a state-wide contest, sponsored by A&T College in which 71 counties were involved.

The announcement was made on Friday by Dr. Glenn F. Rankin, chairman of the Committee on the North Carolina Rural Progress

Campaign, with special reference to Negroes and acting dean of the School of Agriculture at A&T College.

The decision was announced following visits by the Committee to Bertie, Anson, Robeson and Orange Counties, finalists in the contest. The top award includes a \$300 cash prize and a plaque. Other winners included: Orange County, second place, \$250; Anson, third place, \$150 and Robeson County fourth place, \$100.

The cash prizes, "to be used for any constructive purpose of general benefit to the rural people of the winning county" are being given by the North Carolina Board of Agricultural Agencies and Organizations and through contributions being procured by L. L. Ray, director of Foundations at North Carolina State College, Raleigh. Bertie County, one of the largest in the State by land area in the unanimous opinion of the Committee, had demonstrated the most im-

pressive gains, during the past year, in agricultural production and marketing, improved home-making and family living, community improvement and development, provision for opportunities for rural youth and cooperation of all agencies, organizations and institutions, all on the highest plane of interracial cooperation and understanding.

The announcement paid special recognition to the resourcefulness of people of Bertie County in the development of two additional money crops in watermelons and sweet potatoes and for their financing and constructing a modern wholesale produce market in which these commodities are marketed.

It commended the people of the county for their "splendid support and cooperation with both, the professional and lay leadership in the community which resulted in benefit for all."

The award is to be presented at a public meeting to be held in Bertie County later this month.
