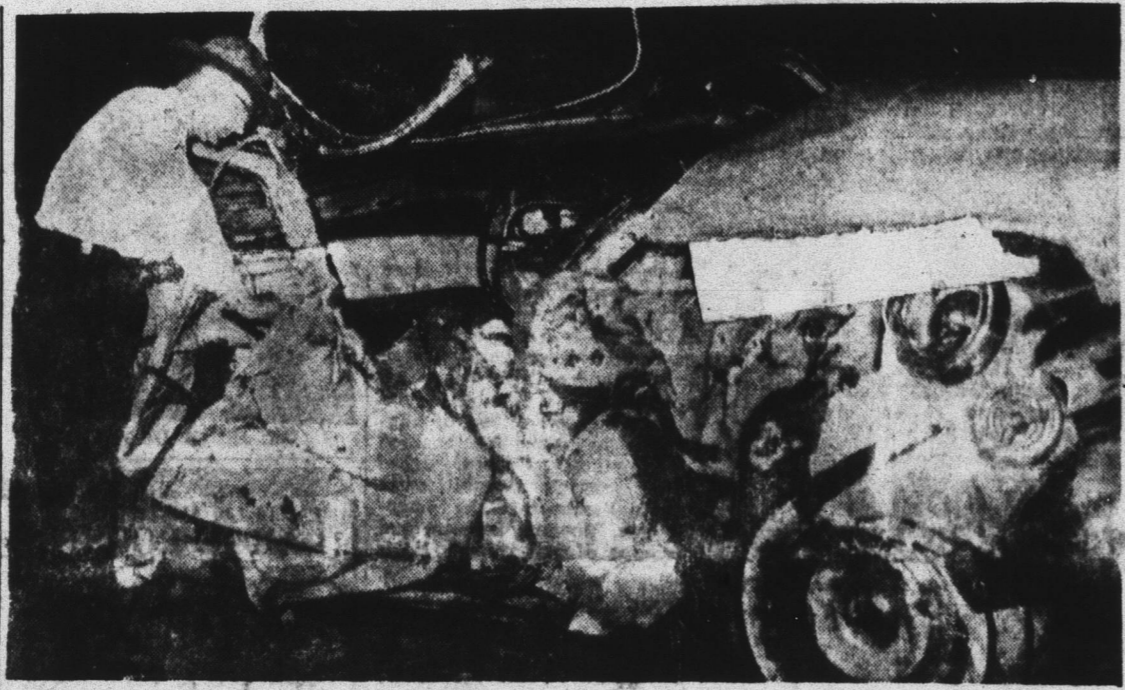
# Faison Draft Talked Registration Goals Being Set By Citizens' Association

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## Driver's Boast Pays Off When Five Die

SUNBURY — "Man, I know how to handle this car." These are the words Donald Vaughn, a 22-year-old Portsmouth, Virginia, man used to describe his driving talents as he took six friends to a dance in Gates County Saturday night.

A few minutes later, Vaughn and four companions were involved in a fatal wreck, three dying on the spot, a fourth on Sunday, and two passengers injured. The grinding five-fatality accident which pushed the State fatality rate into double figures occurred as the speeding car failed to make

a sharp curve on a rural road, slammed into an embankment and smashed into a tree, leaving the vehicle ripped open like a sardine can.

Three of the victims were from Portsmouth and two from Sunbury near where the accident occurred about 9:40 p. m. on a rural paved road about six miles from town. The Portsmouth victims were identified as Vaughn, 22, Shirley

## Ministers Vote Mixing By Sept.

SALISBURY — The integrated Salisbury-Rowan County Ministerial Fellowship, Monday, called for non-segregated seating in the local theaters and for the beginning of school desegregation by Sept.

In a statement adopted unanimously at the April meeting of the Fellowship, the ministers said: "We believe that all men are equal under God, and before the law and that no man should be discriminated against because of his race or his religion." As preparation for integration, the Rowan ministers suggested a program of public education which obviously would be necessary for both adults and school age population.

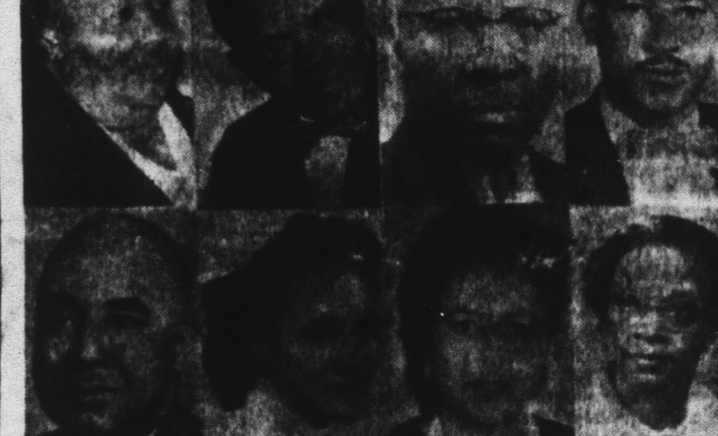
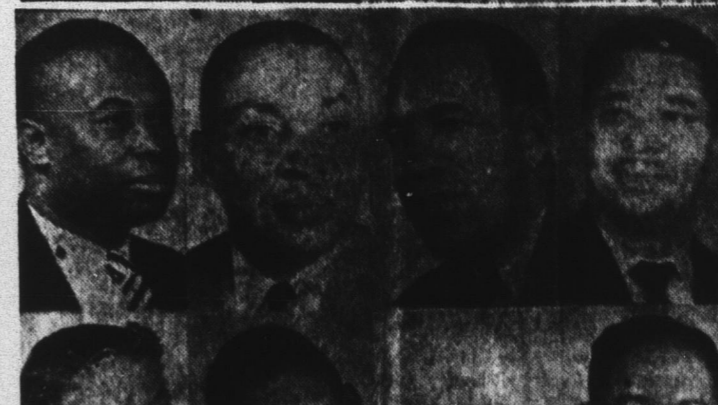
With regards to school desegregation, the statement cited both "our Christian faith" and the United States Supreme Court's decision of 1954 in urging that "the school boards of our community... begin to initiate a logical plan of desegregation by the September, 1962, term."

## Citizens Ready For Campaign

The group was briefed concerning the purpose of the meeting by J. J. Sansom, co-chairman of the Registration and Voting Committee. Dr. John E. Tilley, who led the registration drive in Baltimore, Md. which accounted for over 90,000 new voters, impressed the gathering with his remarks on the importance of a single vote.
