

Sugar Ray Loses Wife And Fight

MEXICO CITY (ANP) — The old saying that "life begins at 40" does not seem to be working out too well for former boxing champion Sugar Ray Robinson.

Now 42, the once great Sugar Man has suffered two jolting setbacks within the last two weeks — one in a London prize ring, the other in a Mexican divorce court.

Robinson's wife, the glamorous ex-chorus girl Edna Mae, obtained a divorce from Ray in Juarez, a Mexican border town across the Rio Grande from El Paso, Tex.

Just a few days before, the "aging" former champion had dropped a decision in London to young Terry Downes. Though he staged a valiant rally toward the end of the fight, Robinson just didn't have enough left to "catch" the British fighter.

Mrs. Robinson and her attorney, Francisco Javier Alvarez, appeared in court for the hearing in which she alleged "incompatibility." She was granted custody of their son, Ray Robinson, Jr., 13, and alimony of \$200 a month.

According to the petition for the divorce, the couple was married in May 1943, in Chicago, and have been separated since Nov. 3, 1959.

Before the Downes bout Sugar and Edna Mae were reported seven engagements in four months, which led friends to believe the pair was contemplating a reconciliation. Edna was even quoted as saying: "Everybody knows I still love Sugar."

A record crowd of approximately 4,000 watched Willie White and James Dickens take turns in streaking through the Adkin Pirates' line or around the ends for long gains time and again. White scored three TD's and Dickens got two.

Early in the first quarter, White started scoring with a 45 yard dash, which followed a 40 yard drive of the mighty "Little Blues". The conversion was made when White threw a pass to Eugene Snipes, making the score 8 to 0.

In the second quarter, White went 10 yards then he ran into the defense of Adkins and pitched out to James Dickens, who trotted 40 yards for Ligon's second TD. The extra points failed. Later in the second quarter White took the ball from the 5 yard line for another touchdown. Once again White threw to Snipes for the extra two points, making the score at half-time 22 to 0.

In the third quarter, the speeding White took a punt and dashed 75 yards for Ligon's fourth touchdown. The extra points were made by Frank Taylor making the score 30 to 0.

Ligon's outstanding defensive players were Eugene Snipes, James Smith, Frank Taylor, George Morgan, Daniel Peebles, Christopher Hunt, Johnny Boykins, Melvin Glenn, Freddie Curtis, and Lawrence Reid.

Ligon has a 3-0-0 record. They travel to Elizabeth City this Friday.

Aggies Sign Top Coaches For Clinic

GREENSBORO—An all-star faculty, including the leading coaches in the nation, has been procured for the second annual A&T College Coaching Clinic, which is to be held next August, 8-10.

Leading the list of instructors are: Woody Hayes, head football coach of the Ohio State University Buckeyes, 1961 Big-Ten champions and 1961 runnerup national champ; Ed Jucker, head basketball coach at Cincinnati University, whose teams won the National Collegiate Athletic Association title both in 1961 and 1962 and Clarence Stasovich, head football coach at East Carolina College, a leading national exponent of the single-wing offense.

The Clinic staff will also include: Bert Piggott, head football coach and his assistants, Mel Groomes and Murray Neely; Cal Irving, head basketball coach, and Hornsby Howell, head trainer, all of the A&T Aggies staff.

At least two new features are to be added at the 1963 event—head coaches of football and basketball champions of the North Carolina High School Athletic Conference are to be invited as instructors, and a workshop will be conducted on problems peculiar to the coach at the rural high school.
