FAYETTEVILLE — The ninth Mid-Atlantic Region Basile Conference of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority was held at the E. E. Smith High School in Fayetteville on Oct. 13. One hundred fifty Basile, graduate advisors, other officers and members representing 43

chapters in Virginia, West Virginia and North Carolina attended. Zeta Pi Omega and Delta Alpha Chapters of Fayetteville under the leadership of Soror Margaret Spivey and Soror Earnestine Thompson were hostess chapters.

Soror Lucille Piggott, Regional Director of Greensboro, was in charge of the one day conference. 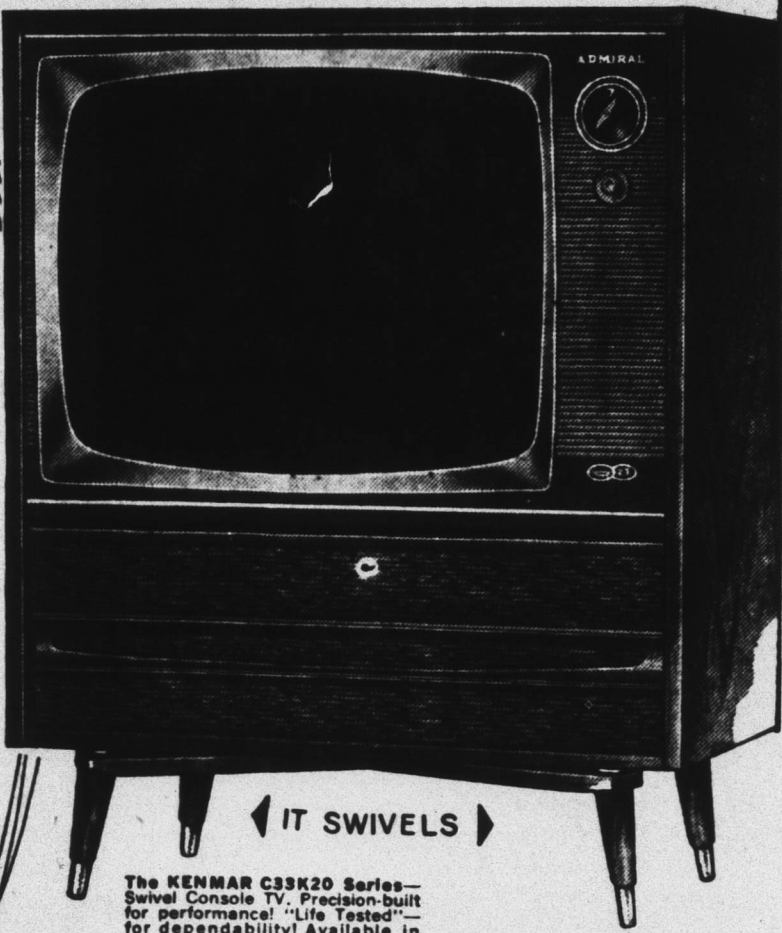
