## EDGECOMBE TUTORS PACE DISTRICT AND STATE FOR HAMMOCKS BEACH IMPROVEMENTS

WILSON — During the First Annual Meeting of the newly organized North Central District of the North Carolina Teachers Association held here at Darden High School Oct. 26, it was revealed that the Edgcombe County Teachers Association led the entire State in the raising of funds for the Hammocks Beach Development project at Swansboro on the ocean.

In an all-out drive to get \$100,000 to improve the facilities at Hammocks Beach, the 4,000-acre ocean-front property left for the use of teachers and their friends by the late Dr. and Mrs. Sharpe, philanthropists, with the stipulation that the colored teachers continue to improve it and use it; teachers, who had originally paid, were asked to pay \$10, while new teachers were asked for \$25 by the board headed by Dr. Rudolph Jones of Fayetteville Teachers College.

Of the \$13,129 reported state-wide to Sept. 1, toward the 100 grand objective \$3,216 was the six-county N. C. District of Edgcombe, Halifax, Johnston, Nash, Northampton, and Wilson Counties, of this, Edgcombe-Edgcombe pedagogy contributed \$1,650.

The nearest rival to Edgcombe in the Hammocks endeavor was Johnson County with \$735; and Northampton, \$330. Halifax reported \$316; Nash County \$140; and Wilson \$45.

Leading the Edgcombe schools in contributions was J. E. Batt's Phillips High with \$250 G. Bullock Elementary, James H. Bullock, principal, tied with G. W. Carver, S. S. Gilliam, prexy, each of whom had \$240 for Hammocks Beach recreational improvements.

Willow Grove, Felix Morten principal, \$235; Robertson, R. H. Pitts, principal, \$215; Conelike High, N. A. McLean, principal, \$195; Livingstone, Mrs. Annie Walton Johnson, principal, \$115; Coker-Wimbly, Joseph Walters, principal, \$100; and Mayo, Mrs. Ada Williams, principal, \$65.

The nearest rival to North Central in this effort was the Coastal Plain District with \$3,127 Piedmont District raised \$2,839 and Southwestern District \$2,027.

Projects listed for Hammocks Beach include: "A complete survey of the property and a master plan of development with drawings and models made by a competent landscape architect estimated to cost \$6,000.

A golf course and swimming pool are listed at \$32,000 and \$35,000 respectively. All-weather tennis courts, \$12,000. Full-time manager and a full-time employee to cost \$4,500 and \$3,800 each.

Leaders of the North Carolina Teachers Association express much concern over the slowness of response by many of the more than ten thousand colored teachers in Tarheelia to this appeal for funds to sustain the project which was so generously given and nobly begun. Even those who are not teachers are encouraged to donate to the project.

**HAMMOCKS BEACH AND NAACP NEED YOU, TEACHERS ROCKY MOUNT** — This column CONGRATULATES all teachers who have exercised their privilege and responsibility to contribute to the very worthy Hammocks Beach Capital Improvement Fund drive to revitalize the enterprise under the late Dr. Sharpe to improve Negro recreation in Tarheelia.

By the same token we condemn the lethargy—failure to act—on the part of those teachers who steadfastly refuse to contribute out of their hefty salaries to a project designed for the good of their own race, given by a white man (and wife) who were interested in promoting better recreational facilities for the Jim-crow race tutors.

We commend, heartily, the leadership of the North Central District Teachers in having led the State in this promotion, even though the amounts given by either district has been nothing special to write home about (even the we have elsewhere in this paper in a hope of stimulating increased interest in the Hammocks project, the neglect of which is a disgrace to the race—particularly to the teachers, our highest educated group).

We would like to commend to the attention of the teachers of all Tarheelia the purchasing, in block form, of \$50 or \$100 worth of NAACP Freedom Seals (at a dollar a sheet) to aid the freedom cause without pain. They should be proud to use these on their mail and packages to encourage the fight for freedom by all Americans.

We repeat, as we have years previous, that Negro teachers should rise to sufficient man and womanhood to contribute, liberally, to causes for their own personal benefit at the NAACP. It is also the hope of the NAACP that they would stop giving gifts to the same of the superintendents and county school officials in a subtle effort to tie down their jobs and further enhance their personal security at the expense of the schools.

We have heard that some white officials have even requested that Negroes cease and desist from such practices in certain communities, but to no avail. This is the type of "education" which prompted an educator recently to declare that "advanced degrees do not always represent a better teacher." That's one reason they are now requiring remedial English courses among teachers; far, too many of whom cannot, read, spell.
