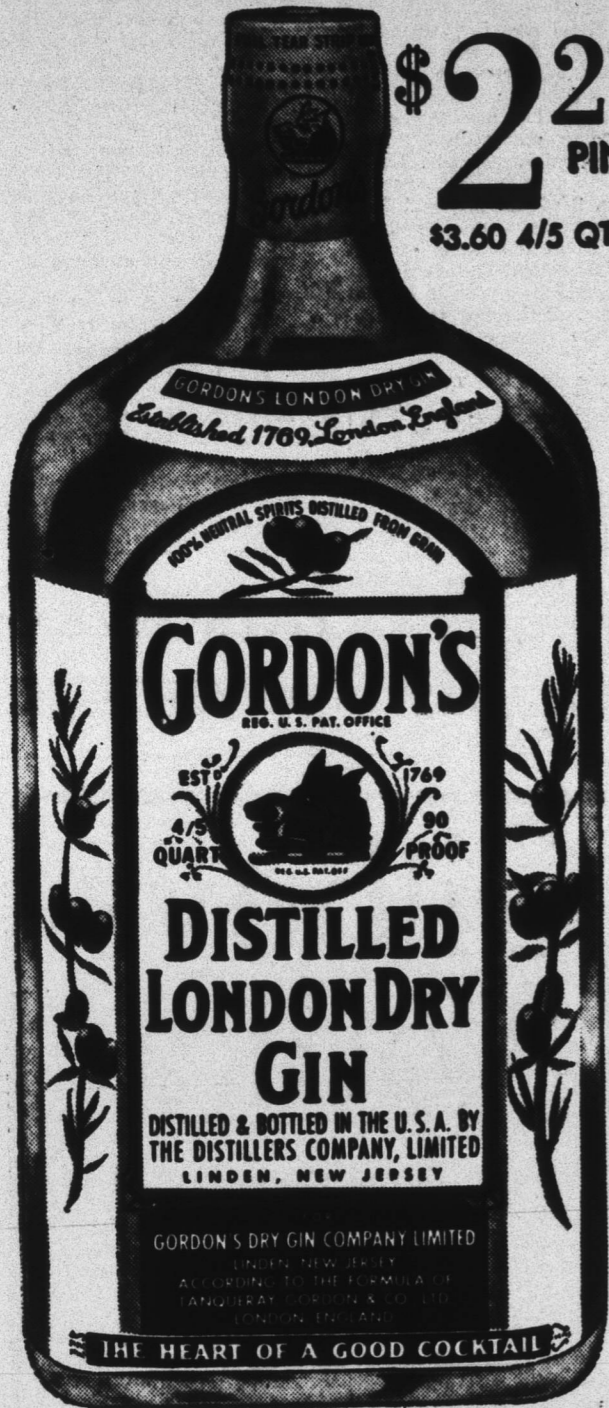


**SOUDAD PROUD DADDY**

### Twist Is Fatal To Phila Woman

**PHILADELPHIA (ANP)** — Funeral services were held here last week for Mrs. Alvera Cook Benson, popular West Philadelphia matron, who died from a possible heart attack while dancing the "Twist" at a cabaret party at the Orchid Ballroom.

A total of 400 persons at the party looked on in shocked surprise as Mrs. Benson stopped in her tracks during the dance and passed out. She was pronounced dead upon arrival at a local hospital.

Funeral services at the Garriet Funeral Home was conducted by the Rev. David Venable, pastor of the Goodwill Tabernacle Baptist Church.

Mrs. Benson's survivors include three brothers and two sisters and her father, Henry Cook.
