 "Behind each cloud the sun is shining. For some days will bring the golden sun, some days the rain will fall, but will be on every one for God doth send them all."

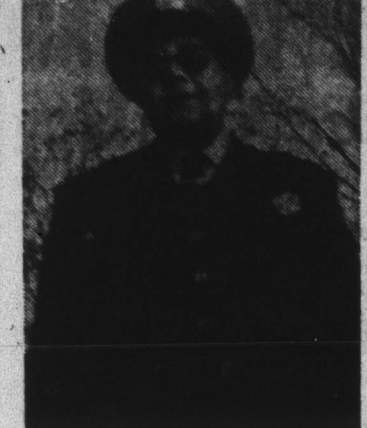
Rhamkatte News

Seek Bids For Method Post Office
 The Post Office Department is seeking competitive bids for an improved building to house its postal operations at Method, Postmaster General John A. Gronowski announced.

Under the Department's construction program, a contract will be awarded to the bidder who designates a building suitable to the Department's needs and agrees to improve it (or provide a new building) according to departmental specifications and then rent it to the Department for a basic period of five years, with three five-year renewal options.
 The Department's capital investment will be limited substantially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes.
 Bidding documents may be obtained from William E. Allen, Real Estate Officer, Post Office Department, Room 435, Post Office Building, Greensboro.
 The Real Estate Officer will supply bidding forms, specifications, rent provisions and other information. Bids must be submitted to the Real Estate Officer by December 23, 1963.
