## Fiery Malcolm X Gets Suspension For Acts

### Rejoiced At Death Of President

CHICAGO (AP) — Fast-talking, overwhelming Malcolm X was silenced and suspended last week by his sect's leader, Elijah Muhammad, head of the Black Muslim sect.

The disciplining followed a speech by Malcolm X in New York in which he expressed jubilation over the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

Addressing a Muslim rally at the Manhattan Center in New York City, Malcolm X had said that the President's assassination was a case of "chickens coming home to roost," asserting that Mr. Kennedy had been "twiddling his thumbs" over the assassination of two Viet Nam leaders, President Ngo Dinh Diem and his brother, Ngo Dinh Nhu.

"Being a farm boy myself," Malcolm X was quoted as saying further, "chickens coming home to roost never did make me sad; they've always made me glad." Then he added that he "never foresaw that the chickens would come home to roost so soon."

The fiery Malcolm X, never one to miss words, also attacked Ne-

## Graham Scene Of Offenses

GRAHAM — A 30-year-old man and a woman of 28 are being held in the Alamance County Jail on charges of rape and murder, respectively.

George Ervin Allen, Route 1, Elon College, faces a rape charge for his alleged assault on Miss Louise Turner, 28, of Alamance on November 9, at the victim's home. He is being held without bond pending the next session of the Alamance County Superior Court when he will stand trial.

Miss Mary M. Clapp is also being held in the same jail on a murder charge, growing out of the strangulation death of her infant son.

Police Chief Henry Hilliard of Elon College arrested Miss Clapp after the body of the unnamed infant was found in a wooded area. A knotted diaper was found around the baby's neck, the chief reported. Coroner Carl Crabtree stated that the infant died by strangulation "on or about November 21."

An anonymous phone caller told where the body could be found, the chief said. Miss Clapp was indicted within 24 hours after her arrest.

According to informed sources, the Clapp baby's body was located near the residence of Miss Clapp's mother.

Both persons are expected to face a judge and jury during the January term of Superior Court.

## Shaw's New President Confident He Can Lead University Out Of Debt

Dr. James Edward Check, the young Shaw University president, who turned 31 years old on December 4, three days after he assumed the presidency of the university, is confident that the institution can be led out of debt under his administration and can reclaim its proud tradition of general academic excellence.

Dr. Check, a 1955 graduate of the university, has returned to his 28-year-old alma mater when it is in the deepest debt that Shaw has ever experienced—\$266,000, and if the debt is not cleared by June of 1964, it will lose its accreditation with the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges. Shaw has already been placed on probation by the Association.

Officials at the university said the answer as to how the school got into such a huge debt are contained in a confused set of record books, dating back as far as the early 1950's.

The chairman of the university's trustees board Dr. J. W. White of Asheville, said the debt was a gradual accumulation of deficits in operations. The trustees, he stated, did not have full knowledge of Shaw's financial status until

recently. This revelation came, Dr. White said, at the same time former president, Dr. William Russell Stramler, was fired from his \$11,500-a-year post as president. This transpired in June of 1962.

Dr. Nelson Herbert Harris, Sr. became interim president of Shaw in August of 1962. One of his first moves was to hire a new business manager, J. Vernon Parham. It was discovered that the business office was several months behind in posting its bills and the records for several years were either badly confused or incomplete.

Dr. Check said a representative of The CAROLINIAN this week stated the university is already planning to remove some of the debt during the Founder's Day celebration.
