

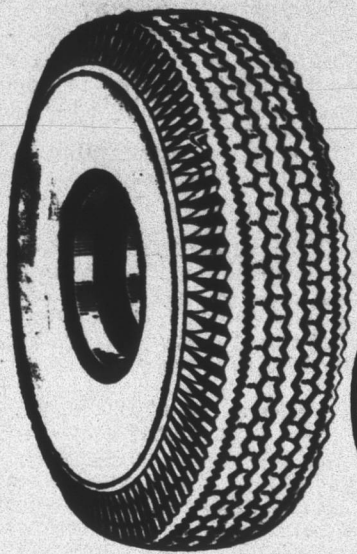
Reid Chapel Queen Crowned

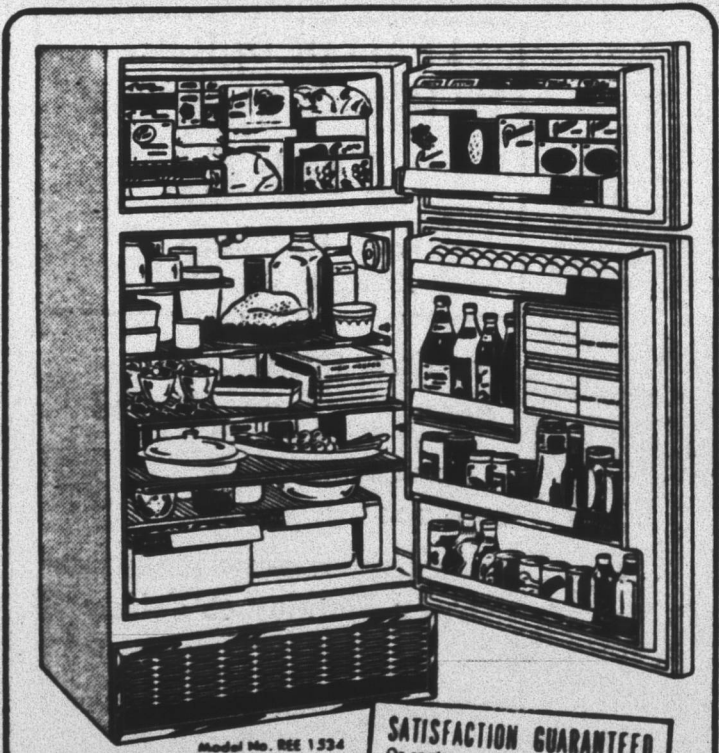

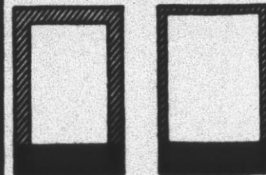

'I Had To, Daddy Said He'd Beat Me,' Says Son, 4, Who Killed His Father

LOS ANGELES (ANP)—As a result of a domestic quarrel and separation of a Los Angeles couple, the father is dead by his young son's hand and a tiny little boy is sadder and wiser.

Leonard Thierry, 32, succumbed to a bullet wound in his forehead 24 hours after ordering his 4-year-old son, Glen, to shoot him. A few minutes before the incident, Thierry had attempted to get his daughter, Theresa, 7, and his older son, Gary, 5, to fire the gun. Both refused.

The younger son, fearful that his father might punish him, shot him with a .22-caliber revolver. "Daddy said he'd get the belt and beat me if I didn't," Glen told officers at the scene.

Thierry, a baker, was described as a heavy drinker by his wife, Mary, who had left the house the previous day after a violent family quarrel. The victim was apparently despondent over her absence. Mrs. Thierry said she left because she was tired of "eight years of nothing but quarrels."

Samuel Booth, a neighbor rushed to the Maple Street home when he heard the shots. He found the father in the front bedroom, bleeding. Brenda Torian, Denise Patterson, Doris Jean Simons, and Naomi Bradley, the Queen, and Roberta Quarles, runner-up.

134 Degrees, 10 Certificates Given As

Editor Harry Golden Draws Large Audience To Commencement At Fayetteville State

FAYETTEVILLE—Harry Golden, Editor of the Carolina Israelite, was the Commencement speaker at Fayetteville State College recently. The speaker brought the largest audience for commencement exercises that the college has witnessed in several years.

Golden reviewed tersely and eloquently the achievements and impact of the Negro Revolution. He further stated that the Negro's chance resides in a literal flood to schools and colleges. Furthermore, he stated that America is a market place of ideas. The Negro must make his voice be heard and exercise his vote.

Dr. Rudolph Jones, President of the College, presented one-hundred thirty-four Bachelor of Science degrees in the fields of Elementary Education, Business Education, Biology, English, Sociology, Mathematics, and History. Ten certificates were presented in Auto Mechanics and four in Secretarial Science.

Miss Jessica Henderson, a History major, Fayetteville, graduated Summa Cum Laude. Miss Henderson was also Valedictorian of the class. Misses Betty Lou Armstrong, Fayetteville, and Geneva B. Williams, Smithfield, were salutatorians of the class and graduated Cum Laude, both are Elementary Education majors. Miss Jessie F. Will-

iams, Clinton, a biology major, graduated Cum Laude. Miss Gloria A. Crawford, an Elementary Education major, Lumberton, also graduated Cum Laude. This Commencement marks the first time in the history of Fayetteville State College that degrees were granted in fields other than Elementary Education.

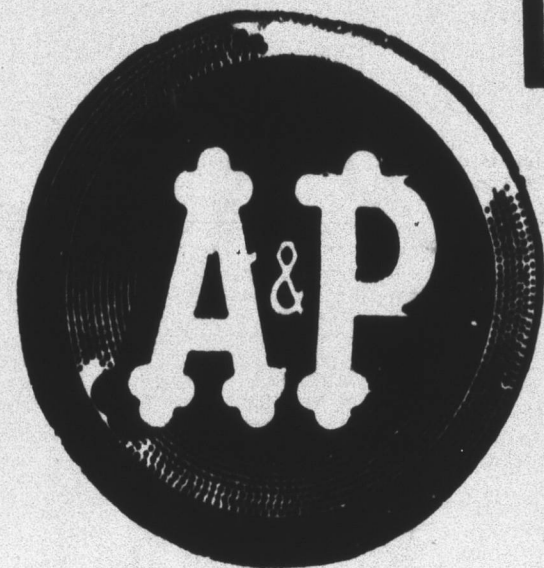
