May the Lord bless brother Taylor and children, in their bereaved state, and give them grace to bear all their afflictions. Many are the afflictions of the righteous but God delivers him out of them all. Our loss is truly very great, but her gain is infinitely greater. I can say to her numerous friends, mourn not for her, her spirit doubtless is clothed upon with immortality and numbered with the angelic host in ascribing praise to him who has redeemed them by his own blood, while her body is mouldering in dust awaiting its redemption, when it shall be raised in the likeness of her Lord Jesus Christ, and shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the zir, and so shall we ever be with the Lord.
