I am now going to try and write out the death of my wife, CHARITY PITKIN.—she was born November 4th, 1823. We were married January 4th, 1856, and she bore me twelve children, nine sons and three daughters, and departed this life July 26th, 1873.—he could not sit up five minutes from the time he was taken to her bed, which was about twenty days, but appeared to be engaged in singing and praying to God all the time, and when I would ask her how she was she would say she felt good, and would begin singing again. We were both baptised the 2nd Sunday in October 1852, and were members of the Black Creek when she died. Myself and children are left to mourn her loss, but I have not a doubt but that she is at rest. I find myself like a lone deer, I go from place to place but can't find my mate.
