OBITUARY.

BROTHER P D. GOLD.—DEAR SIR:-It appears that it has fallen to my lot to offer to your columns the life and death, so much lamented, of Brother Nathanael Torian, also that of his daughter Louisa J. Thompson. So the record of the birth of Brother Torian can not be found, suffice it to say that he battled

with the troubles and afflictions of this world, some eighty years before he was called to leave it. On the 16th of October 1813 he was first married and had one son, who is now living, but had the misfortune to soon lose his wife, and in 1317, the 2nd of October, he married the second time. Like faithful husband and wife they lived happy together, raised two sons and six daughters, his children all stars in the family and luminous ornaments to society. In August 1821 he joined the Baptist Church at Ebenezer in Person County and in October following he was chosen Deacen for the Church, and in May 1830 was made clerk and fulfilled promptly the duties of both offices till he was physically afflicted and disabled. He lived an exemplary life, and retained an usternished claracter both in and out of the Church. When the great split took place in the Baptist denomination he was not carried about with every wind of doctrine but remained unmoved and unshaken always abounding in the work of the Lord, as he knew his labor in the Lord was not in vain. He was a strong arm in the Church, Assistant Clerk in the Association and highly respected in civil society. My pen feels its incompetency in giving him the eulogies his name merits. He was among the firmist Baptists I ever knew, but like all nature, "From dust he came and to dust he must return." "Not unlike David when he served his generation he fell asleep and was gathered unto his Fathers." He was afflicted some time; about two week before his death, he told me his faith was the same, and the eleventh cay of Feburay 1873 the day of his death his faith was still strong, for he said I shall soon be gone Oh! God take me home." Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord, from henceforth yea, saith the spirit that they may rest from their labors, and their works do follow them." "Mark the perfect man and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace."

Louisa J. Torian, was born August the second 1840, was married to Dr. Thompson, the eleventh of April 1860, and died at her residence in Leesburg N. C. on the twelveth of May 1873 of Pulmonary disease She left to mourn her loss a husband and six little children. She was a dutiful child and affectionate wife, a kind mother and much loved and esteemed by trencheors. She was not satisfied with her hope of eternat saltion until a short time before her death, having been concerned from her youth. She was happy and resigned. Her last words were, "is heaven my home, Jesus says so, I shall soon be there" and then fell asleep in the arms of Jesus.

May God sanctify this dispensation of his providence to the good of the aged widow and all the relatives and friends of the much missed deceased is the earnost and humble prayer of the feeble writer.
