Our dear brother, Elder L. R., TEAT, departed this life (after a painful illness of six weeks) on Saturday the 17th inst, at 3. o'lock P. M.

4 ()() I was with him in the early part of his sickness several times, in fact he was taken sick at our church, on our regular meeting 1 00 200 day, the first Sunday in August last.
