In Memoriam.

DIED June 2nd 1875, in Sumpter County, Ala., at the residence of her son-in-law, (Mr. James Daniel,) Mrs. ELIZABETH G. BELL, in the 68th year of her age. She professed religion and joined the Church at Tarboro', N. C., and was baptized by Elder John H. Daniel on the first Sunday in June 1858. She suffered long and much with a cancer, yet bore her afflictions with fortitude and submission to God's will and died in hope of the "Saint's everlasting rest." A. H.

DIED at her residence near Ruffin, N. C., July 6th, 1875, our dear Sister, MATILDA HARRIS, wife of R. D. Harris, in the 56th year of her age. She had suffered several months with inflammatory rheumatism. At times her pains seemed to be almost unendurable, yet she bore it with great fortitude. She had cherished a hope for several years, but never united with the church until about a year ago. She joined the Primitive Baptists at Lickfork, together with her husband, and was baptized by Brother McNeely. She has left a husband who will mourn her loss more than pen can describe.

"The walks they have roamed without tiring, The jest to whose merry inspiring Their mingling of laughter has rung; Oh trifles like these become precious, Embalmed in the memory of years, And the smiles of the past so remembered; How often they'll awaken his tears."

She possessed the highest quality of which the human mind is sensible. The power to call smiles upon the face of misery. No husband has ever lost a better wife; and few children have ever lost such a mother. She was one to be sought in 'distress either in body or mind: in fact she was a spotless woman, gentle, and always attempting to imitate her Saviour, in uniting intense sensibility to sin along with tenderest compassion for the offender, showing in this that "He knoweth our frames." How gentle she was to her children, fearing she would crush a tender heart.

She considered the disposition of those she disciplined. May her six amiable daughters seek to imitate those noble virtues. She ever mingled gentleness with rebuke, could bear with the infirmities of others, making allowances for constitutional frailties. Never said harsh things, as she knew kind words did so much better. She never was known to lacerate the feelings of her friends and associates by recalling former delinquencies. It was the writer's pleasure to be with the deceased a great deal, and he ever appreciated her as a noble wife, mother, and neighbor.

But she is gone to "that bourne from whence no traveler returneth." She has laid her armor by, her sufferings are over. It was through great tribulations that she washed her robes and made them white in the blood of the lamb. Her earthly tabernacle is being dissolved to be resurrected with that blessed spirit which is now with Jesus for "Blessed and holy are they that have part in the first resurrection; on which the second death hath no power, but they shall be priests of God and of Christ and shall reign with Him." These noble qualities have endeared her to the hearts of all who knew her, for she was true hearted, a friend to the poor, not ambitious, "amused to fawning or seeking for power"

By doctrines fashioned to the varying hour." She has left seven children and a husband to follow her example. May the Lord prepare them to do so. Her husband should feel that this is but one more tie cut loose that bound him to earth and another cord to draw him upward and onward.

For "we have no continuing city here." This should alleviate his sorrow to think he too will soon join her in that celestial land where bliss is eternal. May God bless him in the prayer of his nephew.
