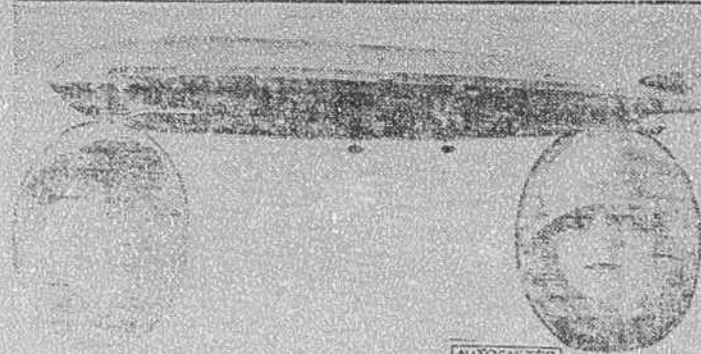
While others of that craft building come sailing on the hills of time, In selfishness and all its use Their hearts are far from us, away from home.
