

NEWS OF WORLD BRIEFLY TOLD

Outstanding Happenings of Past Week Gathered From Every Where, Condensed for the Busy Reader

Jacksonville, Fla., Nov. 14.—The state board of health has today released its calculation showing the known dead from the effects of the September hurricane at 1,867 persons. The death in connection with the storm for the most part were caused by drowning, said the official report. Two deaths were listed from pneumonia and heart disease.

Lynn, Mass., Nov. 14.—Sixteen persons were dead and seven others were in serious condition at the Lynn hospital as a result of an explosion and fire which destroyed the plant of the Freble Box, Ice Company and damaged six nearby dwellings in East Lynn tonight. Twelve of the victims were killed outright by the explosion or exposed to death in the fire when followed it, while four others died after being taken to the hospital.

Springfield, N. C., Nov. 14.—An argument between two men who were considered to be friends resulted in the killing of Ted Robinson, postmaster at Beaufort, N. C., by Will Glenn of Spruce Pine, in the town of the postmaster in Beaufort late Thursday afternoon. Glenn returned to his home in Spruce Pine after the killing and called the sheriff over the telephone asking him to come over at once. Glenn did not wait for the sheriff to arrive but, according to neighbors, he set out in the direction of the town some time, several minutes before the arrival of the officer, and made his escape. The two men were thought to be on equal terms with each other, and no hatred could be advanced for the killing.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 14.—A word will be said to the Latin American countries is proposed by Herbert Hoover, before his return to Washington for his inauguration on March 4. Announcements of the intention of the president-elect will have already been made at the White House in Washington and the Hoover home here today. "I have had the suggestion of a visit to certain Latin American countries before me for some days," said the statement issued by the president-elect. "It has been favorably supported by President Coolidge and Secretary Kellogg. There are considerations at the time relative to other matters which delay final determination for a few days." Although the plans necessarily are indefinite at this time pending diplomatic exchanges between the state department and the countries of South America, he proposed to visit it in the understanding that departure will be made from San Francisco late next week on a battleship, probably the Maryland, flagship of the U. S. battle fleet.

Following are some facts of the election which is considered from practically complete returns from over the nation: Hoover's majority over Smith in North Carolina is about 25,000. Gardner's majority over Sewell is over 38,000. The vote of the electoral college will be Hoover 374, Smith 57. The popular vote for Hoover was about 21,000,000; the popular vote for Smith was about 14,000,000. Hoover carried 29 of the 48 states. Republican-elect Jones by a margin of 100,000 in the tenth, eleventh, twelfth and Weaver. Present indications are that the Republicans will have 17 members of the state senate and 57 C. members of the house of representatives. Votes only carried the states of Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Mississippi and South Carolina. The presidential contest cost both parties a total of about \$15,000,000. Smith lost his home state of New York to Hoover by less than 100,000 plurality.

Catania, Sicily, Nov. 14.—There is no armistice today between Sicily's courage, Mount Etna, and the peasants whose homes and lands the "mountain of fire" has been destroying for more than a week. The streams of molten lava pouring a flood of death and destruction down the flanks of the mighty cone which towers two miles above Sicily show no signs of diminishing. Mascali and Carubia, two of the most prosperous towns strung like beads on the railroad that encircles Etna's base, exist today only in the memories of thousands of homeless refugees. Annunziata is slowly but inexorably being strangled in the fiery clutch of the serpentine lava stream. Riposto and Giarre, towns of 25,000 each, are doomed unless lifeline operations can divert the lava into artificial channels leading to the Ionian sea. The railroad that once connected Catania and Messina has been overrun by a tidal wave of incandescent rock which will soon solidify. So has the road connecting Mascali and Giarre. Today's developments strike new terror into the hearts of the populace of the doomed regions. Experts say there is grave danger that numerous other small crater may become active any moment.

Descendants of Aborigines, Tamias, and the Mongolian in it, now descend through Asia.

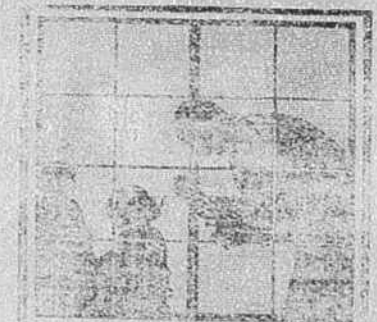

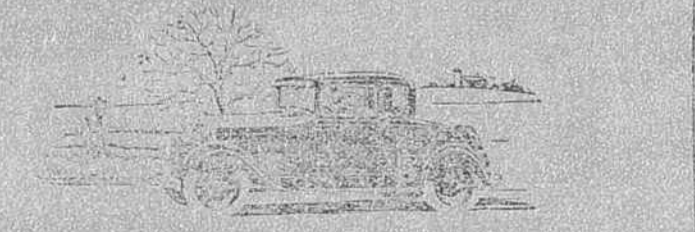
