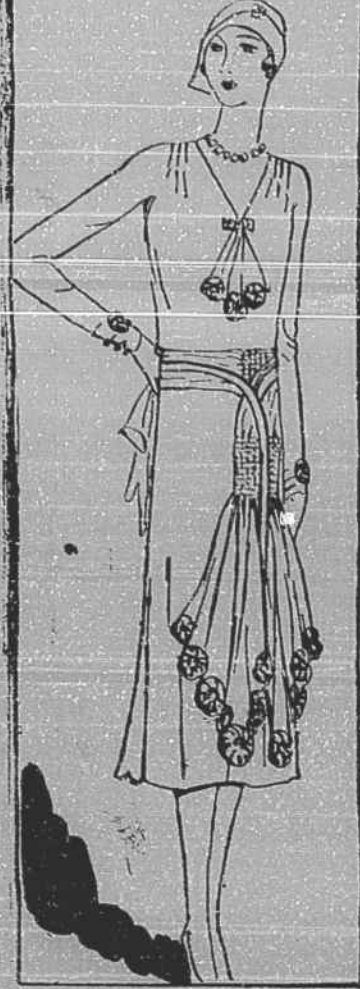
Lamb was ever a standard treat at the in-law's home. So roast lamb it is, with mint jelly jelled in the refrigerator, and green peas.

Honeymoon Cake. 1/2 cup fat, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tsp. lemon extract, 1 1/2 cups self-rising flour, 1/2 cup milk or orange juice, 2 egg whites

Directions: Cream the fat; add the sugar; continue to cream until the sugar granules have dissolved; add the flour and flour alternately with the milk; fold in the egg whites, beaten stiff but not dry; pour into a greased and floured cake pan, and bake in a moderate oven about 30 minutes. Cool and spread the top and sides with orange frosting.
