HIGHWAY PATROLMEN LAY STRESS ON HEADLIGHTS

Raleigh.—Encouraged with the accomplishment of what had seemed an almost incressible task in the past, Captain Charles D. Farmer of the State Highway Patrol is making a ferceful drive against accidents, full the past of the complete and the complete accidents and the complete accidents as week agon by lowing announcement a week ago by State Highway authorities that the number of auto accidents in North Carolina must be substantially re-

With fog, mist and emoke, such as the motorist has encountered during recent days, Captain Farmer is lay recent days, Captain Farmer is lay ing stress on the headlight situation. The patrol chief said today, "When the Highway Patrol began to function in July, 1929, one of the first sarious problems confronting our organization was that of getting two good headlights properly focused on the front of each car and at least one good rear light. With the small number of patrolmen it seemed like number of patrolmen it seemed like a hopeless task to cope with over a half-million autos on the highways. Our men put enthusiasm into their work. We received generally the cooperation of the public and the help of city policemen throughout the State. The result was that over a period of time the menace of the one-eved car was practically wiped out and the benefit to the motorist is difficult to measure in dollars and

Having a larger force of men, Captain Farmer is confident that with reasonable help from the public and the continued co-operation by local police, the highway patrol will be suc-cessful in its attack on blinding headlights and faulty brakes.

"These continue as great dangers to public safety," he said. "When a driver can't see a reasonable distance ahead at night because of blindness brought about by the headlights of cars approaching him and when he can't stop because of faulty brakes, he is unsafe. To reduce accidents we have to first eliminate the chases and this we intend to do."


