ECONOMY INJURING FLEET. HIGH NAVY OFFICER SAYS

Washington.—A high ranking naval officer said last week that the administration policy of reducing naval expenditures was injuring the fleet.

The view of naval officers that more money is needed to maintain an adequate navy had been presented before in mild language, but Rear Admiral F. B. Upham, chief of the Bureau of Navigation, said flatly that tight purse string had been a "severe blow to our navy."

His statement brought the difference between President Hoover and some in and some out of the navy into sharper relief. So did the introduction of a measure by Chairman Hale of the Senate Naval Committee to build the fleet up to the limit of the London naval treaty.

In the immediate background of the controversy between Mr. Hoover and the Navy League is the Chief Executive's view that a reduced budget for the service will not injure its efficiency.

The navy budget sent to Congress today threw additional light on the President's idea of navy needs.

It totaled \$343,000,000, a decrease of \$17,101,593 from the 1932 appro-

riations and \$55,000,000 less than the service originally requested for 1933.

ACT OF KINDNESS COST

MEMPHIS MAN HIS LIFE

Memphis, Tenn.—George R. Mosley, 72, paid with his life last week for an act of kindness.

He died at a hospital of injuries sustained when he stepped aside to allow an aged and crippled negro woman to board a street car in advance of him. As he stepped back, he was struck by a speeding automobile.

His was the 42nd traffic death of the year. Forty-two traffic deaths were recorded here last year.
