FINISHING FURNITURE

How can I put an oil finish on my furniture?

Answer: All dust should be removed from the furniture before any finish is applied. A thin coat of a mixture of two parts of boiled linseed oil and one part of turpentine is then brushed on the surface. After this coat is thoroughly dry it is rubbed down with fine steel wool. For light finishes use white shellac and for darker finishes use orange shellac. Shellac coats should be repeated until the wood pores are filled. Rub down each coat thoroughly. After the last application of shellac is rubbed down the surface is then waxed and polished.

New Bill Allows Boys Under Sixteen to Caddy

RALEIGH, N. C.—Representatives Swift and Meekins introduced a bill in the House of Representatives Wednesday to allow boys under 16 years of age to act as caddies on golf courses in Watauga and Caldwell counties. The bill was passed by the House under suspension of the rules and ordered sent to the Senate. The text of the bill, House Bill 1093, is as follows:

"Section 1. That it shall be lawful for any boy under the age of sixteen to act as a caddy on the golf courses in Watauga and Caldwell counties, it being the intent and purpose of this act to remove any restriction which may exist as to boys under the age of sixteen acting as caddies on the golf courses in said counties.

"Section 2. That all laws and clauses of laws in conflict with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed.

"Section 3. That this act shall be in full force and effect from and after its ratification."

PROSPECTS FOR FISHING IN THE ELK RIVER ARE GOOD

Banner Elk.—Prospects for the fishing season at Banner Elk, which opened on the 15th, are unusually good, according to reports of members of the Elk Falls Fishing Club which held its final pre-season meeting recently in Elk Park. At this meeting Roby Grier of Elk Park was awarded a handsome fishing rod as an award for the largest fish, a 23-inch brown trout, caught in Elk River last season. Other members of the club had records that closely seconded Mr. Grier's catch and all reports indicate that there are many other fish in the stream that equal last year's prize.

Last year hundreds of fishermen visited the Elk stream, which is a privately-owned public fishing quarter controlled by the Elk Falls Fishing Club. Already advance inquiries concerning the fishing regulations and prospects indicate an even better season this year than last. Fortunately the early stocking of the stream with brook trout will make possible the accommodation of a large number of fishermen this season.

In addition to the Elk River, Banner Elk offers further fishing territory in the Wild Cat Lake, a thirteen-acre body of water on the Edgar

Tufts Memorial Association property. This lake has also been heavily stocked with brook trout and will be opened during the fishing season. Fishing licenses may be obtained from John Patton of Elk Park, secretary of the Elk Falls Fishing Club, or from the Exchange at Banner Elk.

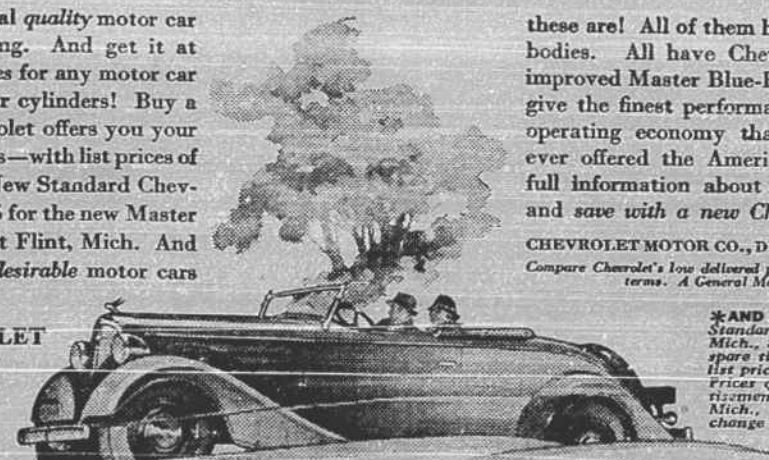

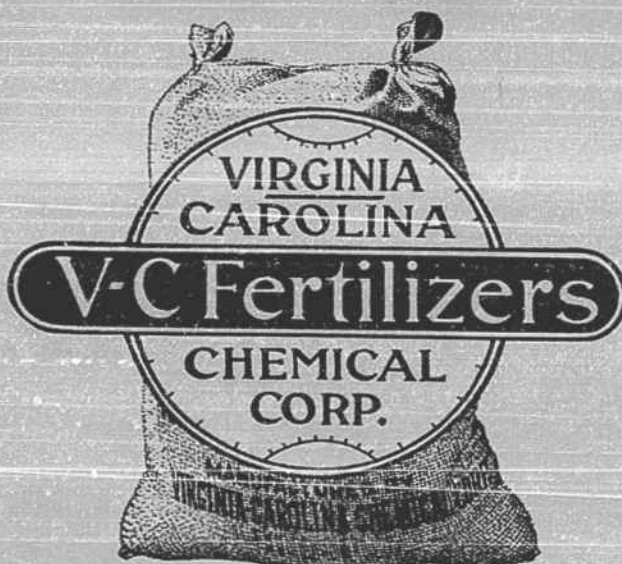
