NO EXTRA SESSION

Governor Ehringhaus does not see any reason yet for calling a special session of the General Assembly and will not call one unless it is absolutely necessary, he intimates. He is not sure the Federal legislation on social security, old age pensions and unemployment insurance, will require a session, but indicates that it must be imperative before he does call lawmakers back. Local papers and others have been agitating special sessions first to take care of the muddled liquor law situation, and now to meet requirements in the social security program already passed by the national House. But Governor Ehringhaus is the only man who can call the session, and he does not want it. The legislators could take up and dispose only of those matters for which it would be called but it does not even have to consider those and may do anything else its fancy might suggest. Governors have been leary of special sessions for a long time, because the Governor has no control over a General Assembly, once he calls it together.

Governor Ehringhaus and State Treasurer Charles M. Johnson spent the week-end in New York signing \$3,404,000 in State bonds recently sold to bond houses.

ATTEND EDUCATIONAL MEET

Dr. James Yaddin Joyner, 72, former State school head, was the "youngest" of the 12 white and two colored educators who attended the annual meeting of the National Education Association in Denver, Colo., June 27-July 5. Dr. Joyner spoke at a life membership dinner and fairly "brought down the house," the other members of the delegation report. T. Wingate Andrews, High Point, was re-elected to the board of directors from North Carolina; Mrs. R. E. Ranson, High Point, was put on the resolutions committee, and Mrs. A. R. Wilson, Durham, on the necrology committee; Mrs. T. W. Guthrie, Kinston, president, and Jule B. Warren, secretary of the North Carolina Education Association, were among those attending.

N. C. SOIL TO RUSSIA

A pound of earth, taken from a few feet of the spot on which Andrew Johnson, after-the-war President of the United States, was born in Raleigh, is on its way to Poland via Chicago, to form a mound at the grave of the late Marshal Joseph Pilsudski when mixed with that of earth from every State of the United States and every nation of the earth. The occasion will be the celebration of the 10th anniversary of Polish independence, a few months from now. The request for earth from some historic spot came to Governor Ehring-

haus from F. Piskorski, chairman of the Greater Poland, Silesian and Pomeranian Alliance, Chicago, and was complied with by Dr. C. C. Crittenden, secretary of the North Carolina Historical Commission.

CHAIR TAKES TWO MORE

The State's Prison electric chair snuffed out the lives of its 151st and 152nd lives last Friday. Lewis Sentell, Shelby, convicted of murdering his paramour, Mrs. William Drake, went to the chair uttering "Drop me in boys and get shot of me. Tell everybody I don't care," after kissing his executioner as he went into the death chamber. In 11 minutes after the switch was turned, he was pronounced dead. Sentell was white and 29 years old. George Whitfield, 24, negro, convicted in Guilford of criminally assaulting a white woman, sat in the chair as a last act a few minutes later. He went in praying and begging that they not let the water from the dripping electrodes get into his eyes. He was gone in about three minutes. Work starts soon on the lethal gas chamber, to be erected in the present electric chair room, and both the chair and the chamber will be used for some time for death penalties.
