These payments consisted of \$4.-615,754.76 for the cotton program; \$51,192.12 for the wheat program; (From Sands): Our community is \$7, 674,014.12 for the tobacco propayments, the AAA has paid, during the same period, the sum of \$1.011 .-607.98 to county and community committeemen and to various persons engaged in compliance work and clerical work in the crop adjustment pro-gram.
