Wool Pool
The 1948 Watauga Wool Pool sold 24,320 pounds of wool bringing a total of \$12,269.51. The wool was weighed on June 18 and 21, and was sold to J. Cam Fields, Mouth of Wilson, Virginia. Ninety-four percent sold as clear medium wool and brought the top price of 51 cents per pound. Approximately 300 farmers participated in the pool.

July Lamb Pool
The second 1948 Watauga Lamb Pool will be on Friday, July 9, at the railroad stock pens at North Wilkesboro. Lambs

will be graded, weighed, and paid for as soon as proper calculations can be completed. Look your lambs over, and if they are ready send them down to North Wilkesboro on July 9.

Sheep Dipping Schedule
The Vocational Agriculture Department at Cove Creek High School, R. G. Shipley, teacher, will start operating the portable sheep dipping vat on Tuesday, July 6. Let me urge you to take advantage of this opportunity to rid your sheep of ticks or lice as most farmers call them.

Nitrogen For Cabbage
Be careful about sidedressing cabbage with chemical nitrogen. You may grow big cabbage, that will give you a high yield per acre, but the cabbage may be so tender that they cannot be shipped. Produce dealers do not want to buy cabbage that has been sidedressed with chemical nitrogen. Use the nitrogen on corn, snap beans, or other nitrogen hungry crop, but do not endanger the cabbage market by sidedressing with nitrate of soda, ammonium nitrate or cal-nitro.

HURRICANE CLAIMS PAID
Miami, Fla.—Insurance claims, totaling 25,332, and amounting to \$11,610,613, resulting from last September's hurricane in this area, have been paid, according to an official of the National Association of Independent Insurance Adjusters.

Churches Urged To Observe the Fourth

An invitation to churches of all faiths throughout the nation to observe Sunday, the Fourth of July, as a day of rededication to our American heritage of freedom by the ringing of church bells and special sermons and prayers, was extended today by the American Heritage Foundation through Thomas D'Arcy, president.

The Foundation is a non-partisan, non-controversial organization established for the purpose of sponsoring a year of rededication to our American Heritage, including the year-long tour of the Freedom Train. Its aim is to help raise the level of active citizenship.

The Foundation urges all churches to ring their bells from 9:55 to 10 a.m. on the Fourth of July as a special anniversary chiming commemorating the ringing of the Liberty Bell in 1776, and to devote sermons that day to the freedoms we enjoy in this country. Mr. Brophy explained. Leaders of all faiths have already indicated wholehearted endorsement of the plan, he said.

"We of the American Heritage Foundation believe that this year, when Independence Day falls upon Sunday, all Americans of every faith and creed have a particularly fitting opportunity to give a striking demonstration of faith in God and country," Mr. Brophy stated.

"This year of the Freedom Train tour with the most cherished documents of our history, has been a year of rededication for millions of Americans to our great heritage of freedom. This is a year when we are realizing anew the meaning and value of our free way of life, and the duty of all Americans to protect and strengthen our freedom through conscientious observance of our obligations as citizens.

"Let this be a day of national prayer for peace, for freedom, and for rededication to our ideals."

4,000 N. C. 4-H Club Youth to Attend Camp

Some 3,000 to 4,000 North Carolina 4-H Club boys and girls will spend a week during the summer at one of the regular 4-H camps and an additional 7,000 to 8,000 members will encamp at other suitable locations throughout the State, according to L. R. Harrill, State 4-H Club leader.

The regular camps, of which there are four, have full staffs of instructors and offer courses in swimming, rifle shooting, recreation, and handicraft. They include Camp Millstone, Richmond County; Swannanoa, Buncombe county; Roanoke Island, Dare county; and White Lake, Bladen county.

The period of operation for Camp Millstone is May 31 to August 28; for Swannanoa, June 28 to July 31; for Roanoke Island, June 14 to August 14; and for White Lake, June 7 to August 28.

Assisting in the camp program are Miss Mary Sue Moser, assistant State 4-H Club leader, and Mr. Harrill. Mr. James is spending considerable time at Roanoke Island; Miss Barber, at Swannanoa; and Miss Moser and Mr. Harrill, at Millstone.

FARM PRICES
Those who believe that the support prices for farm products guaranteed by the Government, are responsible for the high prices at which the products sell, are wrong. Figures for May show wheat at \$2.15 as against a support price of \$1.98. Corn at \$2.13 as against \$1.44, cotton 34 1/2 cents as against 29 1/2 cents, butter 85 cents against 54 cents, and hogs at \$22 per 100 pounds as against the support price of \$15.25 per hundred.
