

TIMELY NEWS FROM THE AAA

Watauga county farmers who still plan to seed rye or wheat as a winter cover crop and expect payment in 1949 for this practice and have not already filed their prior approval with the county AAA committee are urged to do so at once.

So far the county has earned \$36,973.80, which is \$4,000 more than the original allocation. The increase of \$4,000 was granted on September 17, and was quickly taken up. An additional allocation is expected about Oct. 1. This allocation will be used for phosphate and possibly lime.

The State committee has approved the county handbook for 1949. These are being prepared for distribution to all farmers in the county, and the 1949 program will start immediately after the close of the 1948 program.
