Abrams Says

(Continued from page 1) which we must follow" to prevent the wrecking of the educational system of the state. Originally the report intended to "study the quality and quantity of teaching" and to answer the questions, "How well are teachers being trained in teaching training institutions?" and "How well are they teaching the children in the schools?"

Premises of Report

The report, Dr. Abrams pointed out, is based on the following sound premises:

1. Schools of North Carolina need today not so much a review of past famous history as they do a program for the future.

2. The safest, best and perhaps only wise legacy we can leave our children is a good education.

3. Every child born in North Carolina should have the right and equal opportunity to burgeon all that is in him.

4. A state is truly great in proportion to the people that are educated.

5. The conclusions reached in this report were based on honest, scientific research and they represent the wishes of the people of the state, but not necessarily the wishes of the governor of the state or any group of politicians.

6. The people wish to have schools for their children which will be equal to the best; 60,000 said so by a large majority.

7. Enough money can be provided for the following five educational deficiencies: safe, sanitary and comfortable school buildings; an adequate number of competent teachers; enough safe, well-heated, comfortable school buses; an adequate supply of necessary instructional materials and equipment; and such other services as health, guidance, art, music and recreation.

8. With a surplus of \$50,000,000 with all state debts paid, "We have allowed schools to come to want in great plenty."

Premises of Report

The report made the following promises, according to Dr. Abrams review of it: 66% of the citizens and 27% of the administrators thought that the teaching load should be reduced to 30 immediately and 27 as soon as possible. A salary schedule of at least \$2,400 is recommended for ten months of service for beginning teachers and from \$3,600 to \$3,900 for those who have taught twelve or more years. Payment should be made on the first of each month regardless of the

number of days taught. A date should be set, after which, no teacher would be allowed to teach who was not properly qualified. Provisions were also made for sick leave, traveling expenses, etc.

To help the laymen grasp the significance and importance of this report, radio programs and pictorial graphs are being prepared, Dr. Abrams said, and will be promoted through the schools. Complete copies of the report are being sent to the unit presidents throughout the state and to superintendents and other key leaders.

"Hamlet" To Be Given By Barter

Appalachian State Teachers College will sponsor the major presentation of its 1948-49 lyceum series on the night of January 3, when the Barter Theatre of Virginia presents William Shakespeare's "Hamlet."

The lead will be played by Robert Breen, who is also directing. One of the youngest actors ever to play Hamlet, Breen played the part at the age of 21. He has appeared in, or directed, ninety different productions in his lifetime. In 1937 he was engaged by John Barrymore to direct Barrymore's proposed Hollywood Bowl revival of "Hamlet." He directed the original "G. I. Hamlet," a presentation for army personnel which toured the country during the war.

This is the 200th production of the Barter Theatre, which is in its sixteenth year of existence, and now on national tour. Founder and director Robert Porterfield says that it has been their custom to produce at least one of Shakespeare's classics each year, and since 1946 they have played Shakespeare from Pennsylvania to Florida. In two full trouping seasons, the Barter Players have performed Shakespeare in almost 100 cities outside the state of Virginia, and approximately half as many within the Commonwealth itself. The Barter Theatre is the official theatre of the Commonwealth of Virginia, the first state-aided theatre in America. In the two years of its existence as a year-around theatre, Barter has amassed an impressive group of people, a distance of 78,610 miles in 22 states.

This will be the Barter Players' second appearance at Appalachian. They came last year for a presentation of Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night" and played to a capacity audience of approximately nine hundred.

Christmas Drama A Holiday Feature
