The Rev. Robert W. Richardson, pastor, performed the double ring ceremony. A program of wedding music was presented by Miss Kate Dotson, former music teacher of the bride and Mr. Clyde Jackson, soloist. Robert Marlowe, young nephew of the bride, lighted the lower candelabra.

The church was decorated with sunburst arrangements of white gladioli against a background of jewel foliage interspersed with seven branched candelabra. A satin covered kneeling bench was used.

The bride was given in marriage by her father. She wore a gown of candlelight satin fashioned with a single diamond-cut pattern inlaid with illusion extending down the long, tapering sleeves and outlining the rounded décolletage. The moulded bodice, diamonded with crystals, accented the bouffant satin skirt, which fell into a sweeping train.
