

### Appalachian To Hold Off-Campus Class Centers

Appalachian State Teachers College will conduct two off-campus extension centers during the winter quarter, according to an announcement made here Thursday by Chapell Wilson, dean of the graduate school.

One will be at Valdese, and the other will be at Gardner-Webb Junior College in Boiling Springs.

Registration for both centers will be held Tuesday from 4-6 p. m. Registration at Valdese will be in the Valdese Elementary School building, and at Gardner-Webb in the college administration building. First classes also will be held on Tuesday from 6-7 p. m.

At Valdese, Dr. Max Raines, director of the student personnel office at ASTC, will teach Psychology 498, Psychology of Personal Adjustment, and Education 521, Analysis of the Individual. Dr. J. R. Shaffer, director of audio-visual services at Appalachian, will teach Education 494, Audio-Visual Education, and Education 531, Practices in Audio-Visual Instruction. Courses numbered in the 400's carry graduate or undergraduate credit. Courses numbered in the 500's carry only graduate credit.

Classes at both centers will meet on Tuesday and on Dec. 7 and 14; Jan. 4, 11, 18 and 25; Feb. 1, 8, 15 and 22. The hours will be from 4-6:15 p. m., and from 6:45-9 p. m.

Each course carries three quarter hours (two semester hours) credit. A person may take two courses and earn six quarter hours toward certificate renewal credit or as extension credit toward a master of arts degree at ASTC.

The same rules will apply to the work given at Gardner-Webb College extension center. Here Earl Petrey of the ASTC demonstration school faculty will teach Education 446, Diagnostic and Remedial Teaching in Grammar Grades, and Education 406, Investigations in Teaching Arithmetic. Dr. Lee Reynolds, of the ASTC education faculty, will teach Education 504, Supervision of Instruction, and Education 505, Curriculum Construction: General Principles. Dr. James Stone, off-campus supervisor of student teaching at ASTC, will teach Psychology 498, Psychology of Personal Adjustment, and Education 509, Use and Interpretation of Educational Tests.

Appalachian expects to offer work on the Gardner-Webb campus again in the spring quarter, Mr. Wilson also stated. Courses to be offered in the spring quarter will be announced later.

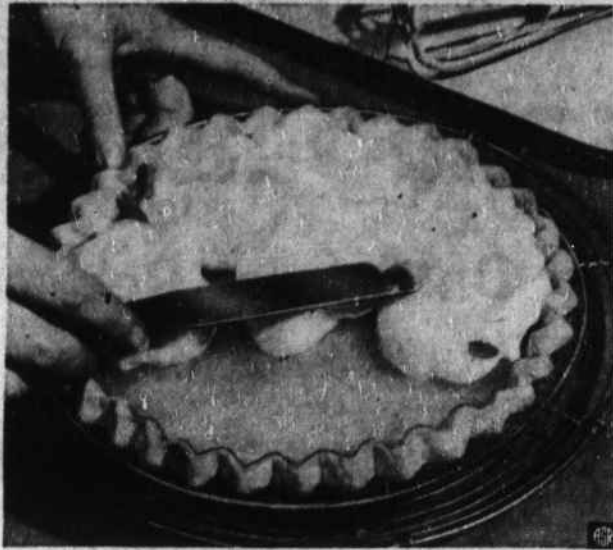

Breathes there a man, with soul so bred, who never to his wife hath said: "I Want A Lemon Pie Like Mom Used To Make!"  
Action is the best reply . . . action quietly engaged in. But when you bake him a pie, make it the modern way with packaged lemon pudding and pie filling mix. Then its texture will be smooth, its flavor rich and tangy. And you'll be sure of it, because, like the modern automobile, which favors over the horse n' buggy, its formula and production are standardized by science to give the best possible results.  
Simply follow the package directions, adding sugar, water and egg yolks, saving the egg whites for the meringue. An added hint—spread the meringue to the edge of the pie, all 'round, to prevent shrinkage. "I'm Glad You Like My Lemon Pie!" will be your demure response when he passes his plate for a third serving.

#### Lemon Meringue Pie

- 1 package lemon pudding and pie filling mix
- 2 cups water
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 egg yolks
- 2 egg whites
- 1 baked 8 or 9-inch pie shell
- 4 tablespoons sugar

Combine pie filling mix, 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 cup of the water in saucepan. Add egg yolks and blend well. Then add remaining 1 1/2 cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full boil and is thickened—about 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Cool only about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice. Pour into pie shell.  
Beat egg whites until foamy throughout. Add 4 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating after each addition until sugar is blended. Then continue beating until meringue will stand in peaks. Spread over pie filling. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 5 to 10 minutes, or until meringue is delicately browned.

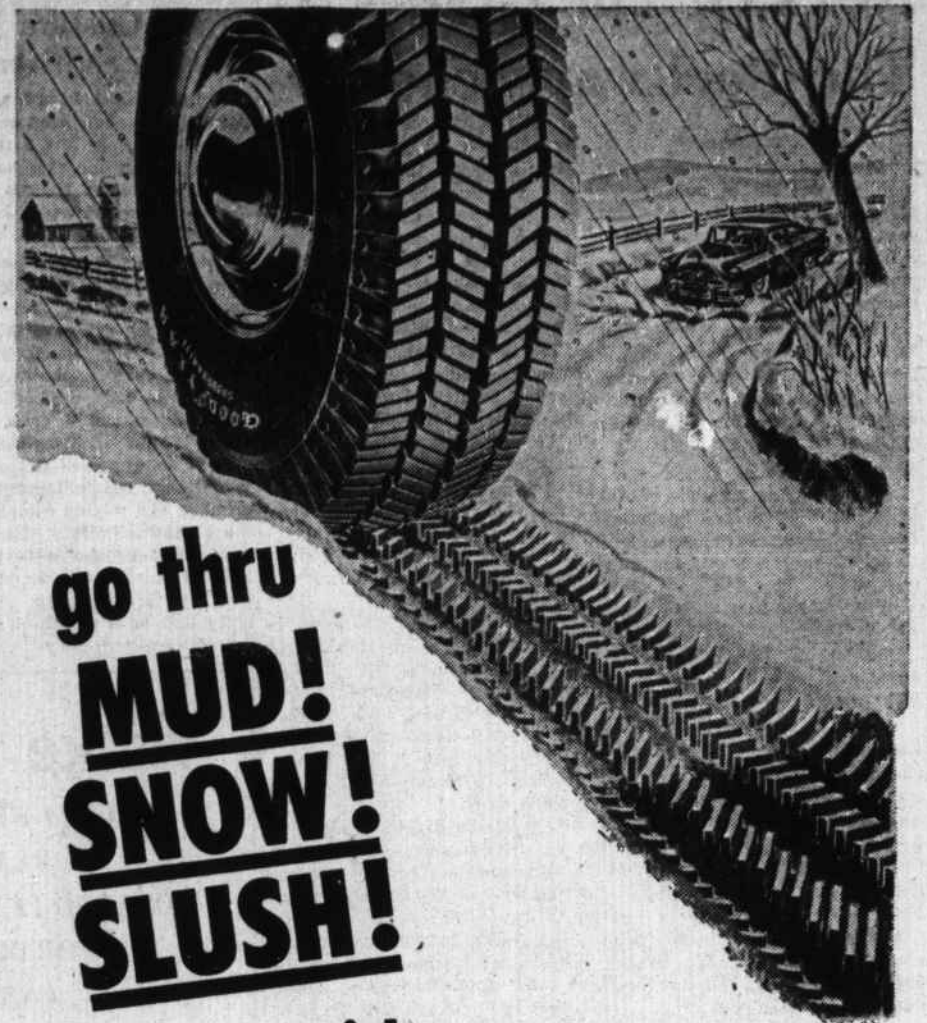
