L. C. Cheek, Jr., of Chapel Hill and Raleigh, recently accepted the appointment of city engineer for the City of Charlotte.

Mr. Cheek, who received his engineering degree from Duke University in 1949, has been employed as a consulting engineer by W. C. Olson & Associates in Raleigh since graduation, except for two years military service during the Korean conflict.

A native of Chapel Hill, Mr. Cheek is married to the former Katherine Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Smith of Boone.

During World War II, Mr. Cheek was a Marine Corps fighter pilot, and later served as a night fighter pilot in Korea when he was recalled to duty in 1951.
