Gordon Nash Honored At Musical Program

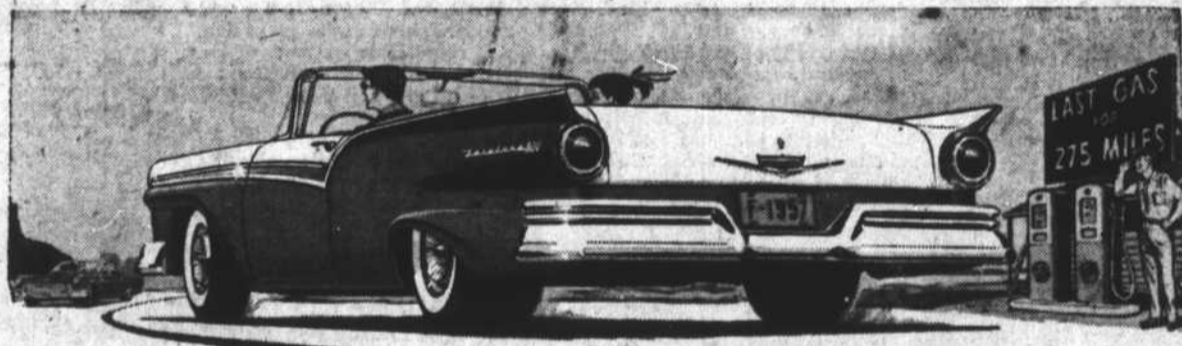

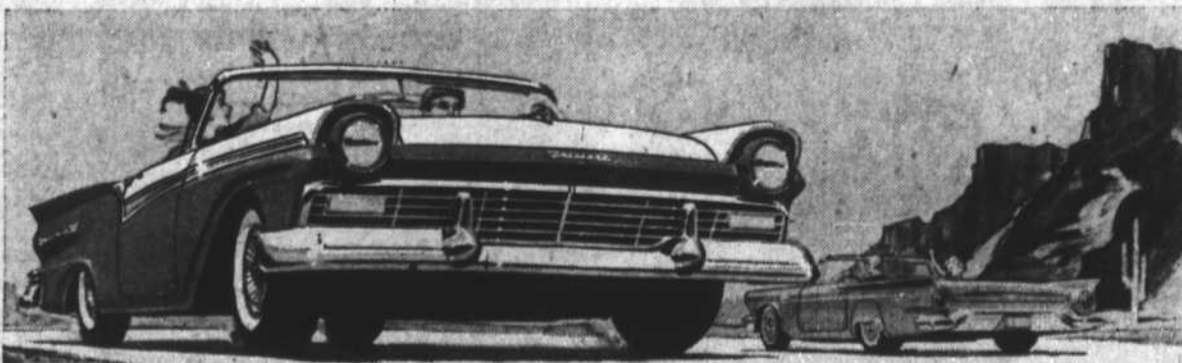
