# Santford Martin, 70, Succumbs On Sunday

Winston-Salem.—Santford Martin, 70, editor emeritus of the Journal and Sentinel newspapers and former chairman of the State Board of Education, died Sunday at Baptist Hospital here. He had been ill of a heart ailment for several months.

Mr. Martin devoted his adult life to newspapering, public education, the Democratic party and the Baptist denomination.

He was born in Yadkin County May 30, 1886, and was graduated from Wake Forest College and Law School in 1909. He was licensed to practice law in 1910, but he never practiced law.

Mr. Martin went to work for the Winston-Salem Journal as a reporter in 1910 and became its editor in 1912. He became editor of the Twin City Sentinel in 1927 when the afternoon paper came under the management of the Journal. He remained editor of both papers until 1952 when he was named editor of the editorial page

of the Journal and Sentinel. He became editor emeritus of the papers on his retirement in 1954. Throughout his 42 years as an editor he spoke out for better schools and highways and against "the liquor traffic," legal and illegal.

Mr. Martin held state government posts under every governor since the administration of Gov. Locke Craig (1913-17). Gov. Craig named him to a commission for flood relief on the Yadkin River.

Surviving are the widow, one daughter, Mrs. Edwina Crowther of Fredrick, Md.; one son, Santford Martin, Jr., of Arlington, Va.; four grandchildren; three brothers, Leroy Martin of Raleigh; Albert J. Martin of Boonville, and Joseph A. Martin of Red Oak; and two sisters, Mrs. Maude G. Paris and Mrs. Raymond T. Vanhoy of Hamptonville.

Funeral services were held Monday at First Baptist Church. Burial was in Forsyth Memorial Park.

Approximately 800 students cast their votes in the run-off election. This represents a decrease in the number of ballots cast last year in the election, when 1,000 students voted.

Joan, a rising senior from Maxton, is a math and science major. She is rising president of Tri Beta, national honorary fraternity in biology; a member of the Science Club; a former reporter for The Appalachian; a B. S. U. counsel member; and a Junior Counselor.

# Advice On Farm Topics

Is it best to buy started pullets—eight to ten weeks old—or day-old chicks? This question is frequently asked by beginners in the poultry production enterprise.

If you want to control diseases in your flock, this is a question you must face whether you are on a large or small scale production, says Glenn Andrews, poultry specialist for the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service at State College. You will normally get the safest replacement stock from hatching eggs or day-old chicks. Many poultry diseases are carried by half-grown or mature birds infected with disease, but showing no symptoms. In many cases a respiratory disease makes its appearance soon after the arrival of started birds that have been transported a considerable distance from where they were brooded.

Often, people who buy what they consider a bargain learn sadly that their "prize" comes down with disease several days after they bring it home.

Purchase of adult flocks has caused several disease outbreaks in various sections of the country. Think about this before you buy started pullets. Don't let "George" raise your replacements. It's easier to let "George" do it, but it may also be costly in the long run. "George" may be raising replacements for other people, too, and will have birds of various ages on his farm. People will be coming and going with crates and vehicles. This is not a good sanitation practice.

Where to buy is important. The best place is usually a hatchery op-

erated under the National Poultry Improvement Plan, or its equivalent in standards, and as near home as possible. The hatchery should have a pullorum-typhoid rating and chicks should be delivered in new boxes. Mr. Andrews says terms such as "Three-Star," "Blue Ribbon," or "Grade A" are not specific enough in their meanings.

A trade-mark means something if the person selling under it follows approved practices. Don't fall for cheap chicks or started pullets. In case you have chicks shipped from a distance, ask your carrier to notify you as soon as they arrive. Make sure your chicks or pullets do not travel over the week end. Most shippers are glad to cooperate with you in making satisfactory shipping arrangements.

"Let's try to solve some of our problems," concluded Mr. Andrews, "by getting good stock from pullorum-typhoid clean hatcheries which are close by."
