### Watauga's Rainfall Divided Between Atlantic And Gulf

Watauga County is not partial to any body of water when it comes to distribution of its rainfall. According to the United States Weather Bureau, water falling in the county may train off to the Gulf of Mexico, or go to the Atlantic

The knowledge of the direction of waterflow is important to the Weather Bureau and others. This is especially emphasized when enough water falls to cause flood-

Up and down some of the rivers can be determined when the water that falls on Watauga will reach certain points between Watauga and its final destination. In cases where floods are expected, people may be evacuated before the flood waters reach them because of the has fallen
