### SMALLER SURPLUS?

The U. S. Government may end the current fiscal year on June 30 with a smaller surplus than the \$1,700,000,000 estimated three months ago by President Eisenhower. The principal upsetting factor is that defense spending is substantially ahead of schedule. Last year's surplus was \$1,625,533,403.

## Local Druggists Are Given Annual Award

O. K. and W. R. Richardson, owners of Boone Drug Co., Boone, are two of the nation's first Rexall druggists to receive the new Mortar and Pestle Trophy, presented by the Rexall Drug Company as an annual award to outstanding member-druggists.

The award is an authentic replica of a 16th century bronze mortar and pestle cast at Deventer, The Netherlands, in 1590. It was presented April 23, by Rexall Representative Roy A. Landreth at Boone.

The historical mortar and pestle, still an important implement in the druggist's profession, is an ancient symbol of pharmacy. Its use for pulverizing medicinal herbs is recorded in the histories of ancient Egyptians, Hebrews of Biblical times and the Roman era.

In an effort to locate authentic originals, John Bowles, president of the company's Rexall Division, asked for the help of the deans of several colleges of pharmacy and the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D. C. The curator of the Smithsonian Institution's division of medicine and public health, George B. Griffenhagen, presented Rexall with a comprehensive history of the mortar and pestle beginning in the stone age when primitive man used crude cups and rubbing-stones for grinding food.

The Mortar and Pestle Trophy, mounted on a black walnut pedestal with a plaque inscribed with his name and store, is on display at the prescription department.

The Rexall Drug Company is continuing its search for these valued antiques, and exact replicas will be awarded annually to Rexall druggists who meet exceptionally high standards of professional ideals, ethical practice and community service.

### FACTORY WORKERS' PAY

The Labor Department has reported that average weekly earnings of factory workers in March, after deduction of Federal taxes, dropped a little more than 30 cents, to \$74.65 for a worker with three dependents, and \$67.25 for a single worker. Factory worker's buying power also declined, reflecting shorter working hours as well as higher living costs.
