Carolina Consumes Less Milk Than Others

North Carolinians consumed approximately 20% less fluid milk per person last year than the average American. Tar Heels were also considerably below the national average than the average American. Tar Heels were also considerably below the national average in ice cream and cottage cheese consumption.

The average citizen of the state drank 134 quarts of fluid milk and cream in 1956, which was a quart more than in 1955. Tar Heel per capita consumption of fluid milk is 80% that of the U. S. consumption of 166 quarts per person. However during the past two years in North Carolina milk consumption has increased 11 quarts per person compared to only a two quart increase per capita nationally.

Last year North Carolinians ate an average of 12.3 quarts of ice cream per person, a quart less than in 1955. Americans averaged 16 quarts per person in 1956. Although per capita consumption of ice cream dropped one quart during the past year in the state, an increase in ice milk consumption was noted with approximately 4.8 quarts consumed per Tar Heel.

Cottage cheese consumption in the past few years has shown a steady increase in consumption. The high protein or body maintaining qualities of cottage cheese plus its being easily digested and readily assimilated has proven popular in the past few years. During the last four years per capita consumption of cottage cheese in North Carolina has doubled from 2-3 of a pound to 1.49 pounds in 1956. Even with tremendous increases in consumption North Carolina is still three pounds under the 4.4 pounds national per capita average.

Although North Carolina is considerably below the national average in per capita consumption of these basic dairy products steady progress has been noted within recent years. Since 1950 Tar Heel per capita milk consumption has increased from 100 quarts to the present 134 quarts per person while the national average has remained approximately the same.
