There will not be any free seedlings for farmers this year. Durteen from 7:00 p. m. to 11:00 p. m. ing past years TVA has furnished seedlings without charge, but this organization is now turning these seedlings over to the N. C. Dept. of Conservation and Development for distribution

The cost of seedlings will be \$5.75 per thousand. At the recded spacing of 8 by 8 feet, thousand seedlings will plant about 1.4 acres. When spot planting is done a greater area can be covered with the same number of plants.

Supervisors of the Watauga Soil Conservation District feel that tree planting is one of the most valuable practices that can be apvaluable practices that can be applied on many farms. Growing timber is one of the best ways of checking erosion. A person can expect a return of from 6 to 10 percent annually for land, time and money spent in planting and managing growing timber.

There are several thousand cres that need to be reforested in the county. Much of this land is now in pasture-so steep that it is almost impossible to apply necessary lime and fertilizer for good grazing. Some of this land is now growing up in briars and brush.
