Over 250 Grads Attend Homecoming At Hebron

More than 250 "graduates" of Hebron Colony and Grace Home gathered at Hebron last weekend for their annual homecoming observance.

The two institutions near Shulls Mills offer Christian help for men and women alcoholics. They are operated by the Rev. and Mrs. E. A. Dillard.

The homecoming weekend began Saturday night with a service featuring individual testimony by men and women who have returned to useful lives in their communities.

The Rev. Mr. Dillard brought a moving message Sunday morning to the group at the first service held in the recently-constructed Chapel on the Hebron grounds.

An outdoor barbecue lunch was followed by a business meeting of representatives of Hebron Fellowship groups which have been formed in various communities of North and South Carolina.

The Rev. Phillip B. Davis, recently appointed superintendent of Hebron Colony, preached at the Sunday night service, and the formal portion of the observance ended Monday with at 10:30 a. m. service and lunch on the grounds.

In the ten years Hebron has been operating, 2,200 men from 28 states and the District of Columbia have taken the eight-week Christian treatment, and Grace Home for women, built in 1953, has graduated 420. Mrs. Nettie Zeigler, a registered nurse, is supervisor of Grace Home.

TWISTERS
The Weather Bureau has counted 702 tornadoes across the country in the first half of 1957, a new record. The twisters killed 130 persons. The worst one hit the Kansas City area May 20, killing 33. Other major storms killed 21 on May 15 at Silverton, Texas; 10 on April 2 at Dallas, 10 on January 22 at Gans, Okla., and 10 on June 20 at Fargo, N. D. Texas was hardest hit with 162 twisters, Oklahoma had 97, Kansas 50 and Nebraska 47.

The election of officers took place at the last business session of the brotherhood state convention at the Blowing Rock assembly grounds.

Both Mr. Lemons and Mr. Crotts are members of the First Evangelical and Reformed Church of Winston-Salem. Mr. Lemons is a former state secretary of the brotherhood and at present is president of the state consistory of the Winston-Salem church.

Rusia has resumed atomic tests with a blast of substantial power, the Atomic Energy Commission recently reported in Washington.

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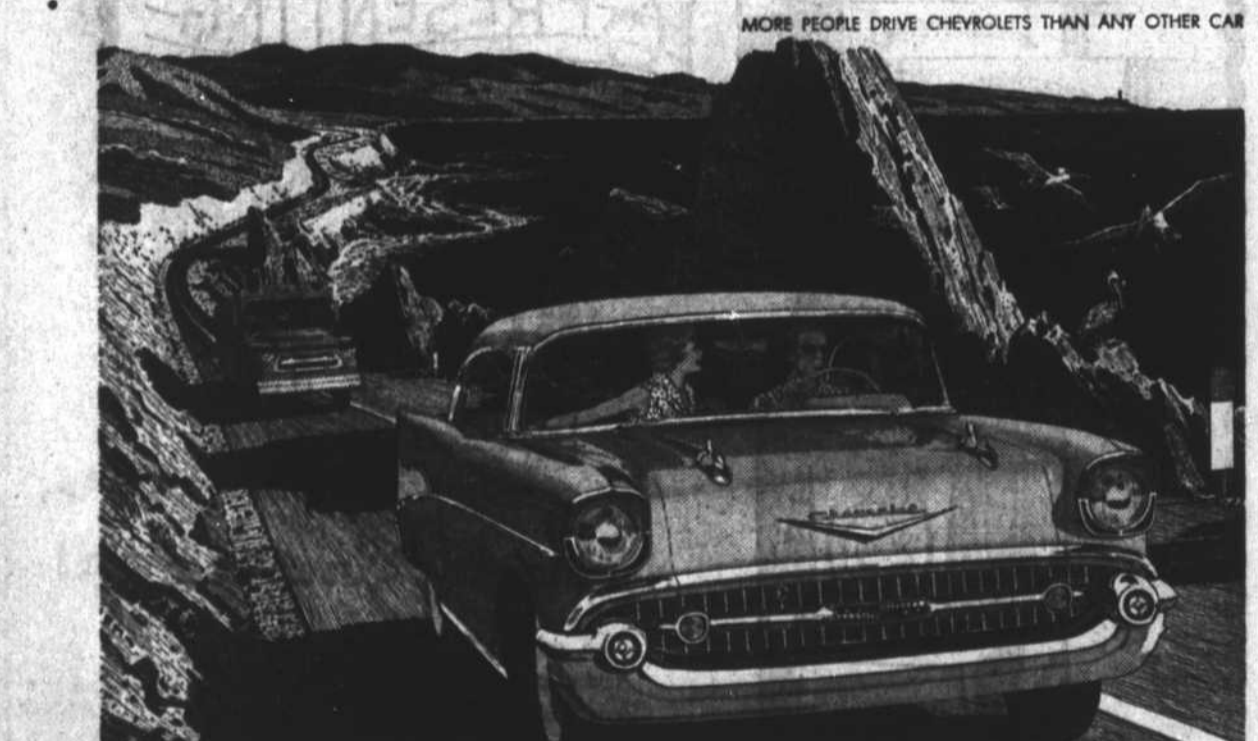
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LITTLE WOMAN
