

TV Teaching Makes Debut In High School

One section of American history at Appalachian High School will be taught along with about 7,500 other high school pupils in the State of North Carolina by means of television. The program reaches about fifty-five public schools in the state and is being conducted on an experimental basis with funds provided by the Ford Foundation.

At Appalachian High School the television set in use was lent by Centre Furniture Company in Boone. Mr. Venable, history teacher, plans to evaluate the results by comparison of the television class with two other history classes he is teaching.

This is part of an extended effort to find a means of alleviating over-crowded classes.

Fitness For Youth

Through our Health and Physical Education classes at school we try to meet the needs of the individual pupil by providing a varied program of activities—individual and team sports, social and folk dancing, and recreational activities.

As educators and lay people, we should strive to provide opportunities for teen-agers to act in situations which are spiritually elevating, mentally stimulating, emotionally stable, socially sound, and physically wholesome. What part can you play in helping to build

all-around fitness for youth?
