## Dr. Van Noppen Tells Lions Of Civil War

The Boone Lions Club heard Dr. Ina VanNoppen tell the story of Watauga county during the Civil War, as she addressed the club at its regular meeting September 17.

Mrs. Van Noppen, professor of History at Appalachian State Teachers College, has just completed a book on Stoneman's Raid. She told the story of the famous raid through Watauga, and other significant developments of the Civil War in this county.

She pointed out that the state, particularly the western part, was divided between sympathizers of the Confederacy and the Union. Quite a few people from Watauga and surrounding counties joined Union army units and some served in this region, she said. Other Union sympathizers frequently lived in the woods and were hunted and persecuted by those persons loyal to the Confederacy.

One of the main functions of the Confederate Home Guard, said Dr. Van Noppen, was to break up the activities of Union groups in the mountains. Some fighting took place before Stoneman's raid, and on one occasion Union troops from Western North Carolina, many of

them soldiers on leave, formed a special company, tricked and surprised the Home Guard unit at Sugar Grove and took the Confederates as prisoners.

Stoneman's raid itself was a major Union undertaking. The cavalry force was to destroy the Virginia-Tennessee railroad, which was Lee's only avenue of retreat from Richmond. After Jefferson Davis fled from Richmond, Stoneman's group received orders to capture the Confederate president.

Boone was one of the first Confederate areas where the Union raiders had to fight, although the skirmish itself was rather minor. Three persons were killed.

Dr. Van Noppen was introduced by Lion Leo K. Pritchett.

## SMALL GAME HUNTS TO START ON FIRST

Raleigh—Small game hunts for squirrel will start October 1 this year, the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission said this week.

Western wildlife areas scheduled for these early hunts include Firea Creek, Standing Indian, Wayah Bald, Pisgah, Rich Laurel, Flat Top, and Daniel Boone. Other areas will be open to small game hunters later in the season.

Management area personnel report good crops of squirrels, apparently a result of a good mast crop. Grouse hunting will start October 15 and small game hunters may also take rabbits on some of the areas. Groundhogs and wildcats may be taken on any of the small game hunts.

Hunting will be by special permit secured at the checking station on the day of the hunt. Hunt schedules and information sheets may be secured from the Raleigh office of the Wildlife Resources Commission or from county and refuge protectors, sporting good stores, or the U. S. Forest Service.

TAX CUTS It now seems probable that there will be more emphasis on the part of both Congress and the Administration on the reduction of taxes in the next session of Congress. The proposed cuts in Government spending are seen as signals for a slight cut in taxes for everybody all down the line next year. It must be remembered that this 1958 is an election year and this fact alone makes reductions more probable.

## NEWS ABOUT OUR Servicemen

FRED COVINGTON TAKING PART IN MANEUVERS North Atlantic—Fred Covington, seaman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Covington of 2810 Broad Creek Road, Boone, N. C., aboard the heavy cruiser USS Albany, is taking part in "Operation Strikeback," a large-scale naval and air exercise in North Atlantic waters during September 19-25.

More than 150 vessels from North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries will participate in the 10-day operation. "Strikeback" marks the first time since 1963 that forces under NATO have been engaged in large-scale combined fleet maneuvers.

Nations taking part include: Canada, France, Norway, the Netherlands, United Kingdom and the United States.

During the exercise the NATO forces will range over the North Atlantic to waters adjacent to the British Isles, the Iceland-Faroes Gap, the Norwegian Sea, and portions of the North Sea.

Air and submarine opposition, anti-submarine warfare, aircraft carrier operations and the simulated use of guided missiles and atomic weapons in offensive and defensive action will be included in the exercise.
