## 4-H Club Boys, Girls Have One Of Best Years

North Carolina 4-H Club boys and girls who have participated in the 1957 4-H Public Speaking and Community Relations programs are completing one of the best years in history, and the project years ends October 1, when records are to be received in the community relations project, according to L. R. Harrill, State 4-H Club Leader.

Harrill said a committee of county and home demonstration agents in North Carolina will judge the records during the week of October 7, and two state winners in the community relations work—a boy and a girl—will be named to receive certificates of honor. The records of the two state winners are to be judged in regional competition, and eight regional winners are to receive all expense paid trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago December 1-5. The two national winners in the project receive \$400 college scholarships. The North Carolina National winner last year was Jane Parkins, Guilford County.

The community relations activity provides ways to 4-H'ers to take part in local civic and school events and to gain confidence and poise in appearances before groups.

Offering 4-H'ers somewhat similar opportunities, the public speaking project provides awards for county, state and national winners.

Alan Feimster, Alexander County, is the 1957 champion 4-H Club public speaker among North Carolina boys, and receives a 19-jewel wrist watch. Joretta Clark, Haywood County 4-H Club girl, is the champion in the girls group and receives a set of silverware.

On the national level, two college scholarships worth \$400 will be presented to the highest ranking boy and girl during the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, and the records of the two North Carolina winners are to be submitted for consideration in the national contest.

Harrill said that the Pure Oil Company sponsors the public speaking program, and the William Wrigley Jr. Company is donor of the awards in the community relations activity.

## Honey An Aid Meal Variety

If you're one of those meal planners who enjoys flavor and variety in meals, then you'll find plenty of honey on the retail counters to help you in your job of serving meals with taste appeal.

According to Ruby P. Uzzle, Agricultural Extension Service consumer marketing specialist, this year's honey crop is a big one. Consequently, homemakers who are not acquainted with the merits of honey in the preparation of tasty dishes can plan to experiment with honey, while those who use honey often will find ample supplies to fill their needs.

There are several different forms in which honey is marketed, but three fourths of it is sold as extracted honey, Mrs. Uzzle explains.

The four major forms of honey as listed by Mrs. Uzzle are:

1. Extracted honey is liquid honey removed from the comb and is usually sold in glass jars.
2. Comb honey is honey still in the honeycomb and is sometimes sold in the wooden frames as taken from the beehives.
3. Chunk honey is a combination of comb and liquid honey. It consists of pieces of comb with extracted honey poured over them.
4. Creamed honey, also known as granulated honey, is a product made from extracted honey which has been caused to granulate in mixture crystals, giving it a creamy texture and a semi-solid but soft consistency.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture lists five variations of honey color as being water white, extra white, extra light amber, amber, and dark.

Like all other sweets, honey is an energy-producing food. Extracted honey is about one-fifth water. If it were not for this, a pound of honey would have practically the same energy value as a pound of granulated sugar.

Honey is a pleasant source of readily available energy for growing children. Since bacteria which cause diseases in human beings cannot live in honey, it is considered safe and wholesome.

Use honey in your meals to provide that extra energy your family needs.
