

Purpose Of Carolinas United Is Outlined

Because major civic leaders in the two Carolinas believed in the value of federated giving and because they believed that the solution to the problems facing federated giving was to create more federated giving, an organization called Carolinas United Community Services came into being.

Thesis Accepted For Publication

Primary purpose of the organization is to extend and strengthen federation in the Carolinas. A means by which United giving communities in the Carolinas could exchange information, achieve more cooperation, improve techniques and have professional help is why Carolinas United was organized.

Although Carolinas United is not a fund raising organization in itself, it helps local communities set up successful programs and campaigns to raise funds for worthwhile health, welfare and recreation services.

The organization provides field service to existing United giving communities. It helps organize undeveloped areas.

Carolinas United is under the supervision of a Board of Directors composed of 225 leading citizens from 101 communities. Through this state-wide federation program, communities can have the benefit of the strength and resources of state wide leadership.

A 34-member working Executive Committee keeps busy determining the policies of the organization and a large sub-committee system further promotes United giving in the Carolinas and brings each of the 325-member board into active participation.

In spite of the completeness of the organization and its membership blanketing the Carolinas, there is no direct line of organization between local United Community Funds and the state organization. Each local unit is autonomous.

The only tie is the common purpose in promoting federated giving.

Carolinas United was created by local federated organizations of which Watauga County is one, to serve the needs of all communities. Its job is to remain sensitive to the needs and desires of the local organizations and it can do so by the very nature of its structure.
