Ancient Bell Placed In Chapel Wm. Brown Is Tower At Hebron Colony .

An ancient 400-pound bell rings out a clarion call to worship from the brand new chapel on the mountainside at Hebron Colony.

Its full, rich tones echoing through the hills and valleys are as pure and sweet as when it was fashioned by master craftsmen nearly three-quarters of a century

It is a gift from a friend.

When the Rev. E. A. Dillard, who with Mrs. Dillard has maintained the Christian home for the rehabilitation of alcoholics at Shull's Mills for the past ten years, decided to build a new chapel on the grounds last summer, an idea was born in the mind and heart of a man who knows and loves the Dillards and their work, Attorney W. Marshall Bridges, Sr., of Florence, S. C.

Mr. Bridges made a sentimental journey to Mount Carmel, S. C., and found the bell reposing, unused for many years but still giving silent inspiration, in a little prayer room of the Mount Carmel A. R. P. Church. The bell tower of the old church, originally known as Lodemont and built in 1875, had long since become too weakened by the ravages of time to support the massive bell in

The friend of Hebron persuaded the committee in charge to part with the bell, which had been purchased for the church by the Rev. L. A. Patterson on June 17.

It was manufactured in 1886 by the McShane Bell Foundry Company of Baltimore, Md., from genuine bell metal-80 per cent copper and 20 per cent tin. It weighs 369 pounds, plus 40 pounds for mountings, making a total of 409 pounds. The McShane Foundry, which celebrated its 100th anniversary in 1956, is the only bell manufacturer left in the United States. A complete history is kept of every bell sold dating back to 1856.

The Mount Carmel bell was delivered to Hebron, as a gift from Attorney Bridges, on July 1, 1957.

In the ten years Hebron Colony has been operating, more than 2,200 men from 28 states and the District of Columbia have taken the eight-week Christian treatment for alcoholics and have returned to useful lives in their communi-

In 1953 the Dillards bult Grace Home for women alcoholics near Hebron, and have helped more than 420 women find a spiritual solution to their problem.
