Sutton Goes To Louisville

O. R. Sutton of the Appalachian State Teachers College Business Education faculty will attend the 38th annual convention of the Southern Business Education Association to be held in Brown Hotel, Louisville, Kentucky, November 28, 29, and 30.

A galaxy of eminent business educators and atomic experts will deliver addresses on the theme of the convention: "The Impact of the Jet and Atomic Age on Business Education."

The keynote speakers will be Colonel Ray Mervin, Civil Air Patrol of the USAF and director of School and College Service for United Air Lines, speaking on "The

development of air youth in the field of education and training," and Charles B. Mervin, Jr., general manager of the Automotive Trade Association of Virginia, delivering an address entitled "The Many Hats in Human Relations."

Sutton will be assistant chairman of a meeting conducted for colleges and universities. The topic to be discussed at that meeting will be "Problems of Increasing Enrollment in Business Departments and Colleges of Business Administration. In a later meeting, Sutton will head a panel to discuss "Teaching Business Arithmetic in an Atomic Age."
