Sealed proposals will be received by the President and Board of the Holston Presbytery Camp, Inc., in the Lounge Room of the First Presbyterian Church in Johnson City, Tennessee, until 2:30 p. m. on June 5th, 1958, for furnishing materials, machinery, equipment and labor and doing all work required for the construction of a Reinforced Concrete Water Tank, small Water Distribution System and 440 feet of 6-inch Vitrified Clay Sewers located on the Presbytery property near Banner Elk, North Carolina, at which time they will be publicly opened and read.

Plans, specifications, and proposals may be obtained from Fred Dickerson, at Lees-McRae College in Banner Elk, North Carolina or from D. M. Shoies, Engineer in Burnsville, North Carolina upon a deposit of \$15.00. The full amount of the deposit for one set of documents will be returned to each actual bidder submitting a bona fide bid upon return of all documents in good condition within 5 days after date of opening of bids.

Each proposal must be accompanied by cash, certified check, or bid bond, made payable to T. A. Freeman, President, Holston Presbytery Camp, Inc. in the amount of not less than 5 percent of the bid submitted. Said cash, check or bid bonds will be promptly returned to the unsuccessful bidders, and to the successful bidder upon execution of the contract and performance bond. Should the successful bidder fail to execute the contract within 10 days after notice of acceptance of his proposal the cash, check or bid bond will be forfeited to the Board of Holston Presbytery Camp, Inc.

A performance bond, to be paid for by the contractor will be required in an amount equal to 100 percent of the contract price conditioned upon the faithful performance and awarding the contract.

Payment will be made on the basis of 90 per cent of monthly estimates and final payment within 30 days after completion and acceptance of the work.

Contractors are notified that "An Act to Regulate the Practice of General Contracting," passed by the General Assembly of North Carolina and subsequently amended, will be observed in receiving and awarding the contract.

Award will be made to the lowest responsible bidder, provided it is to the Board's interest to accept such bid. Alternates contained in the proposal will be used in the Board's interest and at its option. The Board reserves the right to reject any or all bids, and to waive informalities.

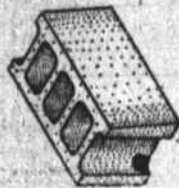
The group visited Wake Forest College, Winston-Salem Airport, Duke University, Botanical Gard-
