Bishop Henry To Visit St. Luke's Sunday

The Rt. Rev. M. George Henry, DD, bishop of western North Carolina will visit St. Luke's Church in Boone next Sunday and will be the preacher at the 9:30 service.

This will be his last service before leaving next week for the Lambeth Conference in London. This conference is called by the Archbishop of Canterbury and is held every 10 years at his residence, Lambeth Palace, in London, and is attended by about 350 bishops of the Anglican Communion. Churches represented at the conference operate in 40 countries with well over 40 million communicants.

Christian Unity Will Be High on Agenda During the 5 Weeks Conference

There are friendly exchanges between the Eastern Orthodox Church and the Anglican Communion and in Britain there are friendly exchanges between the Church of England and Methodists, Congregationalists and Baptists, something that was unheard of until recent years. A report is being studied for reunion between Scottish Presbyterians and the Church of England.
Bishop Henry will fly to Copenhagen and visit on the continent before going to London and will return to the United States late in August.

Incident At Sevia

About sixteen miles from Banner Elk, toward Newland, is a little community by the name of Sevia. It was here at the general store many years ago that an incident occurred which made people talk for weeks.

One day a young couple was driving through the mountains and stopped at the store in Sevia for a drink. The woman went into the store and while there, she noticed a picture of President Theodore Roosevelt on a calendar. She went to the door and asked her husband to come into the store and see the picture. She then inquired about the picture to the storekeeper, Mr. McCoury who replied, "That is the greatest president that ever lived."

The young woman was touched by Mr. McCoury's admiration for Mr. Roosevelt. After talking with him for a little while, she introduced herself as the president's daughter.

A few weeks later Mr. McCoury received an autographed copy of one of Mr. Roosevelt's books, which is kept and treasured today by the McCoury family who still live in Sevia.

Mr. Zelah McCoury, son of the elder McCoury, is the principal of the Banner Elk Elementary School.
