

To Break Ground For Banner Elk Hospital

Saturday, June 13th will mark a red letter day in Banner Elk, and this area for the Appalachian mountains, the dedication of a recreation building at Grandfather Home for Children, and groundbreaking ceremonies for Grace Hartley Memorial Hospital's new 100 bed hospital and outpatient diagnostic and treatment facilities. At three o'clock the Anne Bryan Recreation Building will be dedicated with a dedicatory address by the Reverend David W. Baker, M. D. of Philadelphia, introduced by Mr. Charles A. Cannon, of Concord. This beautiful and fully furnished building, to be known as the Anne Bryan Recreation Building, gift of Mr. and Mrs. Robert G. Hayes, of Concord, is to be presented by their son Robin, to Miss Anne Bryan, Superintendent of Grand-

father Home for Children. Dr. Joseph H. Carter, President of the Home, and of Edgar Tufts Memorial Association, will officially receive the building and offer a dedicatory prayer. The invocation is to be by Dr. R. A. Brown of Kingsport, Tennessee and the benediction by Dr. M. O. Sommers of Morristown. The groundbreaking for the new hospital a short distance away, will follow the dedication ceremony. The program is at this time incomplete, but those taking part include Dr. David W. Baker, of Philadelphia, Marshall Pickens, of Charlotte, director of the Duke Endowment, William F. Henderson, of Raleigh, acting executive secretary of the North Carolina Medical Care Commission, Charles A. Cannon, Concord industrialist, Robert G. Hayes, of

CONCORD, chairman of the Expansion and Development Committee and of the Building Committee, Dr. Lawson Tate, director, and Dr. Joseph H. Carter, president of Grace Hartley Memorial Hospital. The site for this hospital is on Highway 184, as it parallels Elk River, just outside the Banner Elk town limits, and the project, shortly to be let to contract, will represent an outlay of \$1,900,000, 90% of which has been raised by grants and gifts during the past six months.

WATAUGA COUNTY SCHEDULE "B" LICENSE TAX LEVY

NORTH CAROLINA WATAUGA COUNTY
To the Tax Collector of Watauga County—

You are hereby authorized and ordered to proceed on and after June 1, 1958, to collect all license taxes due this county as provided for in Schedule "B" of "The Act of One Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-Seven (1947), amending and supplementing the Revenue Act of One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-Nine (1939)." Taxes shall be imposed as a County License Tax for the privilege of carrying on the business, exercising the privilege, or doing the act named, in accordance with the following schedules, as well as any other provisions of the act not specifically set out in this schedule:

You are further authorized to issue 1/2 year license on and after the first day of January, 1959.

Lensmen Hear Lectures On Grandfather

Linville—Seated on the rocks around the weather station atop Grandfather Mountain, two dozen amateur and professional photographers heard lectures Sunday by two national experts.

The photographers were attending the annual Grandfather Mountain Camera Clinic which began Saturday and ended Sunday.

The experts were Donald Wayne, assistant managing editor of Parade, a Sunday magazine supplement, and Allan Gould, nationally known free lance photographer of Miami, Fla.

Wayne, discussing the development of the picture story told the cameramen that it is important to know he market at which they are aiming, to read the magazine they hope to sell, not once but ten times, in order to be able to "angle" their pictures accordingly. He told them that in photography, as in music, simple ideas are the best.

Gould advised the photographers to use their eyes and ears to get ideas which he said are "all around you." And he told them it is essential to know as much as possible about the subject they are photographing.
